Mayor Tecklenburg sworn into office Hundreds gather for historic day in City of Charleston

Under the midday sun on January 11, beneath picture perfect blue skies on the steps of City Hall, in a ceremony marked by spirited choir voices, poignant poetry, and glowing words of praise showcasing past and present, the Holy City welcomed it's first new Mayor in 40 years.

West Ashley resident John Tecklenburg, who once called Daniel Island home, took the oath of office as Mayor of the City of Charleston from Retired South Carolina Circuit Judge Richard E. Fields, a longtime friend of the Tecklenburg family. Fields, who met Tecklenburg's late father, Henry, in 1949, recalled a recent moment when a friend asked if he felt Tecklenburg would have success following the tenure of revered former Mayor Joe Riley. Fields answered with confidence.

"He will bring to that position a love of God with all of his heart, with all of his mind. and with all of his soul, and he will treat all of his neighbors as he treats himself," Fields told the crowd, many of whom were bundled up in warm winter coats and scarves due to the day's chilly temperatures.

Under Fields' direction, after raising his right hand and placing his left on the Bible, Tecklenburg recited the oath and ushered in a new era of leadership in the City of Charles-

"I want to personally thank the citizens of Charleston for this incredible opportunity that I have to serve," he said at the start of his in-

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auguration speech. "What an honor to become Mayor of my hometown. It is at the same time humbling and exciting. Never before in our city's history has a Mayor taken office in a moment so rich with the promise of a better future for all of our citizens."

Tecklenburg devoted a good portion of his remarks to paying tribute to his predecessor, calling Mayor Riley the "best Mayor in America," maybe even "the whole world."

"Before we turn to our plan to make that hopeful future our own and a reality, let's pause to recognize our current good fortune is not some happy accident of time and place," he said, as Riley sat just a few feet away on the stage. "We have not arrived at this moment by some chance...We are here in no small part due to the leadership of one man, a man who has led our city with courage, grace and dignity...Through it all, no matter how trying the times or difficult the challenge, he always made us proud. Proud of him, proud of ourselves. Proud to be Charlestonians."

"You've left our city more prosperous, more united, more just," he continued. "History will record that you were a giant, and history will be right!"

In a lighter moment, Tecklenburg joked that in moving some things into the Mayoral office on January 10 with his wife, Sandy, he found a large, oversized pair of shiny red clown shoes with bright yellow laces in the closet.

We learned that our neighbors depended on us to collect the papers as we promised. We learned how to find the best price for our product. And all these years later I still find myself carrying stacks of papers around the neighborhood!

And Now the Good News (part 2)

Part 1 addressed the compelling issue of world hunger, and the significant strides being made worldwide. Today, in Part 2, we explore an equally dynamic topic: Is humankind progressing? Today's column provides excerpts from a recent debate held among four of the world's brightest minds.

Is humankind progressing? Do man's best days lie ahead?

A one-hour news feed from CNN (nearly every hour of the day) might convince you otherwise. It's the downside of a 24/7 news cycle – we endure one thousand impressions of the latest crime, tragedy or killing – be it human or weather-related – and, honestly, it can't help but cloud our perspective.

Yet a quick look back, to nearly any time in history, assures us that every generation experiences its own unique set of worries and fears. Why would this time in history be any different?

That was the issue explored this past fall at the Munk Debates*, a series of semi-annual debates vetting issues of substance (prior topics included: The West vs. Russia, Gender in the 21st Century, North American Economy, Religion, Healthcare, Climate Change and Humanitarian Intervention).

Four authors took the debate floor – on the pro side, Harvard Professor Steven Pinker and House of Lords member Matt Ridley built a compelling case

that man's best days do indeed lie ahead. Opposing them, journalist Malcolm Gladwell and public philosopher Alain de Botton made their claim that today's threats (e.g., nuclear proliferation, climate change, et al) are indeed of a different order.

Clear from debate reviews was that Pinker – armed with facts and figures - carried the day. Pinker opens with two memorable lines: "Journalists report plane crashes, not planes that take off," then adds: "As long as bad things haven't vanished from the earth altogether, there will always be enough of them to fill the news." His compelling arguments rested on 10 elements that revealed, with little hyperbole, that humankind is indeed progressing. Following are Pinker's 10 points, drawn from the transcript of the Munk Debates:

- 1. Life itself: "A century and a half ago, the human lifespan was 30 years. Today is it 70 and it shows no signs of levelling off."
- 2. Health: "Two of the greatest sources of misery in human existence [smallpox and cattle plague] have been eradicated forever. The same will soon be true for polio and guinea worm and we are currently decimating hookworm, malaria, filariasis, measles, rubella and yaws."
- 3. Prosperity: "Two centuries ago eighty-five percent of the world's population lived in extreme poverty. Today, that's down to ten percent and, according to the UN, by 2030, it could be zero."
- 4. Peace: "Globally, the annual death rate from wars has been in bumpy decline, from 300 per 100,000 during World War II, to 22 in the 1950s, 9 in the '70s, 5 in the '80s, 1.5 in the '90s and 0.2 in the '00s. Even the horrific civil war in Syria has only

budged the numbers back up to where they were in 2000."

- 5. Safety: "Global rates of violent crime are falling in many places precipitously. The world's leading criminologists have calculated that, within thirty years, we can cut the global rate of homicide in half."
- 6. Freedom: "More than sixty percent of the world's population now lives in open societies, the highest percentage ever."
- 7. Knowledge: "In 1820, seventeen percent of people had a basic education. Today, eighty-two percent do and the percentage is rapidly heading to a hundred."
- 8. Human Rights: "Ongoing global campaigns have targeted child labour, capital punishment, human trafficking, violence against women, female genital mutilation, and the criminalization of homosexuality. Each has made measureable inroads and, if history is a guide, these barbaric customs will go the way of human sacrifice, cannibalism, infanticide, chattel slavery, heretic burning, torture executions, public hangings, debt bondage, dueling, harems, eunuchs, freak shows, foot binding, laughing at the insane, and the designated goon in hockey."
- 9. Gender Equity: "Global data show that woman are getting better educated, marrying later, earning more, and in more positions of power and influ-
- 10. Intelligence: "In every country, IQ has been rising by three points a decade."
- * The 90-minute debates began in 2008 and are a charitable initiative of the Aurea Foundation cofounders Peter and Melanie Munk. Last month's debate, on humankind, was held at the Roy Thomson Hall in Toronto, in front of an audience of 3,000. TV viewers also looked on.

Ten Years Ago -Talk of water taxi coming to DI

In the January 12, 2006 issue of The Daniel Island News, the feature story was about Charleston entrepreneurs Chip Deaton and Scott Connelly who hoped to establish commuter ferry service for Daniel Island residents. Their business, Charleston Water Taxi, continues to make crossings between Mount Pleasant's Charleston Harbor Marina and the downtown Charleston Maritime Center. The operators estimate that the journey between Daniel Island and downtown would take about 20. The service to and from Daniel Island never came to fruition. Also, at the same time, the Charleston Area Regional Transit Authority (CARTA) was to begin servicing Daniel Island on January 9. However, according to a CARTA representative, services including a Park and Ride stop was delayed until further notice. This service, too, never came to fruition.

In other news, it was announced that the South Carolina Electric and Gas (SCE&G) power transmission lines connecting the St. Thomas Island substation with the Mt.

Pleasant Longpoint substation were to be buried under ground. The decision to bury the lines, as opposed to installing overhead lines, was announced by Mayor Joe Riley at a press conference on Daniel Island. The reality of the underground lines was a direct result of land donations that offset the cost differential of overhead lines. SCE&G officials said.

Five Years Ago -Fire Prevention and Safety Tips

In the January 13, 2011 issue of the Daniel Island News, the centerfold featured an article about fire prevention and safety tips. "Fire causes are often related to heating," said Mike Julazadeh, the then Fire Marshal and Battalion Chief for the Charleston Fire Department. "Often, alternative heating sources are used."

"Unattended cooking" remains high on the list as well, stated Julazadeh. Basic preparedness, including having working fire extinguishers and smoke alarms in the home, as well as an emergency plan, can mean the difference between life and death. According to the American Red Cross, approximately 65 percent of house fire fatalities occur in homes with no functional smoke alarms.

What's the number one mistake people make?

"Before the fire – failure to plan, prepare, practice and prevent," added Julazadeh. "During the fire – failure to evacuate quickly, assuming they can handle the fire (and) it grows quicker than expected. This also delays calling for help, again delaying our response and we must deal with a more significant event."

Other island news included, the Daniel Island Company's Employee Advised Fund (EAF)

reported that it distributed more than \$40,000 to 17 mostly local charitable initiatives in 2010.


Funded through voluntary payroll deductions from employees caught fire in 2009. of the Dan-

"It's been talked about...that I have some big shoes to fill!" he said, before pulling the shoes out of a bag during his speech. Riley laughed in response, as did the crowd, and told the audience that the shoes were actually from the Ronald McDonald House. Afterwards, Tecklenburg presented Riley with a commemorative plaque from the City of Charleston and its employees for his four decades of dedication and distinctive service.

Tecklenburg then used his pulpit to talk about what happens next for the city. He spoke of targeting traffic and tourism, recreation and redevelopment, public safety and public engagement, and transparency - all issues he frequently discussed on the campaign trail.

"There is much work to be done!" he said. "Work that we should and must do together. First we must tackle the problems that have come with our success, particularly in the areas of livability and quality of life...We face challenges that we can only solve by coming together around a responsible and robust plan of action."

Immediately following the ceremony and an afternoon reception on Monday, Tecklenburg planned to convene a meeting of city officials to jump start the redevelopment and strategic revitalization of West Ashley, another item on his list of campaign goals. Before the end of the day, he expected to place calls to regional leaders to further efforts to complete I-526. In the days, weeks and months ahead, he also promised to work with City Council and citizens to address flooding and rising sea level concerns, to improve the public transit system and safety for pedestrians and cyclists, to achieve sustainable growth that respects the environment, to improve the delivery of basic city services, and to help empower "our brothers and sisters in need, including our homeless citizens."

Another challenge Tecklenburg hopes to meet is that of ensuring real, meaningful opportunities for all citizens, regardless of religion, race, creed or circumstance, he said. He plans to work across communities and jurisdictions to end disparages in education, to provide more affordable housing, and to seek social and economic justice.

"So here, in this unfolding story of Charleston's history with a promise of a hopeful future, let us challenge ourselves this day to accept any test or trial and respond with excellence and enlightenment," said Tecklenburg, his voice rising from the podium. "To be open and inclusive to show that good citizens work-

ing collaboratively can tackle any challenge. To show that with faith in God and love in our hearts, we will be an example to the world, not just in the wake of tragedy, as Charleston has already done so beautifully, but in our actions going forward...That's how we truly earn the name of the Holy City."

Among the day's other speakers were South Carolina's Poet Laureate Marjory Wentworth and local artist Marcus Amaker, who shared a poem they wrote together to commemorate the occasion.

"Though Charleston is a shrine to the past, where every alleyway and weather-worn road tells the story of a city resurrected, time is never standing still," recited Wentworth. "Running beneath the surface are fault lines of our own making, reshaping memory brick by brick."

"...As the earth shifts beneath our feet, we move forward together," continued Amaker. "Our hearts unhinged, guide us toward a city remade by love, into a future that our past could never have imagined, beginning today."

The event also included the swearing-in of several newly elected or re-elected City Council members, including Daniel Island resident Gary White, who has represented District 1 for the last eight years. White thanked his family and all of his supporters for helping him throughout his campaign, and also praised former Mayor Riley for his leadership.

"I look forward to continuing to serve the city and the citizens of the City of Charleston." he said.

Daniel Island resident Chad Vail and his wife, April, who is Tecklenburg's niece, brought their children along to take part in the inaugural festivities.

"It was exciting and historic," said Chad.
"Charleston has had the same Mayor for so long, my whole life in fact. It was very special to be there and to see the emotion, and of course the singers, and the fun things that made that event special. But also the setting, the historical setting, our four corners of law. It was an amazing time in an amazing place."

As the momentous program drew to a close, before a rousing performance by the soulful Lowcountry Voices, Tecklenburg summed up the city's new marching orders.

"So now, with a unity and purpose of clear goals in mind, the work begins...It's an ongoing journey, but we know this - with good will, hard work, and a commitment to excellence in all that we do, Charleston's best days are yet ahead!"

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A most dynamite duplex: new HQ for Peace Love Hip Hop and CrossFit Discovery

Disco ball reflections shine on one floor, chalk dust settles on the other. Sneakers squeak in unison opposite a staggered symphony of falling barbells. Under her direction, eight-counts run on repeat to nearperfection; under his, rounds for time recur to near-exhaustion.

This is the brand spankin-new head-quarters for Peace Love Hip Hop and CrossFit Discovery on Daniel Island. It is fresh construction, physically housing (but hardly containing) both the studio and gym under one roof. And it's owned by an island resident husband and wife team. Angel Roberts started the PLHH movement inside rented space almost a decade ago. Robert VanNewkirk coached the first CFD class in his home garage in 2009. In the years that followed, both businesses would outgrow multiple spaces. So to create their own was almost always the plan.

"As soon as we moved here in 2007, we realized that Daniel Island is a very special place because of how close everything is," VanNewkirk recalls. "It's amazing how you can walk (or bike/cart) to everything

you need. We wanted our business to be an extension of that lifestyle and allow for CrossFit and hip hop to be a central part of such a close-knit community."

But it wouldn't be a cohabitation of convenience. Despite the obvious markings of distinction between the two recreational phenomena – heavier loads in the gym versus heavier bass in the studio, to name just a couple – they share many of the same celebrated hallmarks. Truly fun fitness. A supportive, inclusive community. An all-out sweat-fest. And what is a hip hop booty drop, really, if not just a sassier CrossFit air squat?

There are more synergies to the pair of programs, as well. For one, they "share" many of the same families. Several CFD athletes are parents of youth PLHH dancers, and many of the adult hip hoppers supplement dance with CrossFit. "We wanted to make sure that the whole family had a place to go where they could be together, have fun, and be active," says Roberts of the combined facility.

There were also some efficiencies to be observed, with shared lobby space, in-house physical therapy, a kids' play area, and men and women's showers. And before the amenities were built into the new building, they were just a few of the notions inside the heads of the entrepreneurial duo. "We have been dreaming and talking about the space for years," says Roberts. "It's been such a fun design project!"

The owners worked with architects Richard Gowe and Rush Dixon; Dan Sweeney and his Stumphouse Design team; and contractor David Iaria, President of T.A. Iaria, Inc. But it seems that it has also been a labor of love that has been touched by those who

"There are so many things that we love about the building and are most excited about all of the SPACE," Roberts gushes about the 2.500 square foot studio and 3.500 square foot gym. "We can't wait to have huge dance parties and big group CrossFit classes. More space = more friends!"

And you know what they say... Friends that sweat together, stay together. Regardless which side of this movement mecca you enter.

CrossFit Discovery currently offers morning, noon, and evening classes Monday through Friday and morning class on Saturday. Peace Love Hip Hop offers afternoon youth classes throughout the week, and adult classes in the evening. More classes will be added, so visit crossfitdiscovery.com and peacelovehiphop.com for the most current information. Watch for summer camp information in the coming months as well.

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City launches online business license renewal system

Staff report

Earlier this month the City of Charleston launched a new online service that provides Charleston business owners with a convenient way to renew their business licenses. Businesses with existing licenses now have the ability to renew their licenses online directly through the City's Customer Access users will go to http://charelston-sc.gov/cap Portal at http://charleston-sc.gov/cap. The new online business license renewal system is a password-protected, secure system that can be accessed by businesses that receive a business license renewal notice in the mail. Notices were mailed the first week of January and to avoid penalties renewal is required by January 31, 2016.

"This new online service has been a top priority for the City of Charleston. Our goal is to make it as easy and convenient as possible for people to conduct business with our City and this is just one of the many things we are working on to facilitate convenience for the Charleston business community," said Mayor Joseph P. Riley, Jr. 29413

A City of Charleston business license is required for any organization or person that George Street, Charleston, SC.

conducts business within the City, even if the business is physically located outside of city limits or the company or person has a business license from another city.

Most businesses with an existing license can renew online by creating an account, which will be verified by City staff within 2 business days. Once accounts are confirmed and enter Gross Receipts from the previous Fiscal Year and Allowable Deductions to complete the renewal. The City accepts the following payment methods: MasterCard, Visa, American Express, and Discover. Once the transaction is complete, you can print and keep the payment receipt at the business establishment as proof of renewal. The business license certificate will arrive, by mail, within 10-14 days

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
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Three Characteristics of Exemplary Leaders

Leadership is a matter of having people look at you and gain confidence, see how you react. If you're in control, they're in control. - Tom Landry

A story is told of Gen. George C. Marshall when upon taking command of the Infantry School at Fort Benning, GA, found the post in a generally run-down condition. Rather than issue orders for specific improvements, he simply got out his own paintbrushes, lawn equipment, etc., and went to work on his personal quarters. The other officers and men, first on his block, then throughout the post, did the same thing, and Fort Benning was brightened up. Leadership by example.

Many a leader want to equip their teams to achieve certain results, move the company forward, set new sales records, etc., but fall short at the most basics leadership practices to get there.

Living a life of exemplary leadership is not an elusive goal that only a select few can attain. You can live it every day if you will simply follow the example of Gen. Marshall. Here are three observations from the story that can elevate your leadership.

EXEMPLARY LEADERS ARE DECISIVE

Arriving at Ft. Benning, Gen. Marshall found run-down conditions. Rather than assess blame or pull rank by assigning the task to men under his command, he took decisive action and began the work himself.

There is a time and place to forge strategy, communicate across the spectrum, and otherwise set plans into motion that will best serve your organization. But there is also a time to act.

Do you want to be a decisive leader? Exemplary leaders are those who see what needs to be done and do it.

EXEMPLARY LEADERS ARE **ENGAGED**

One of the largest complaints among employees that you will find in most any survey is that they have a manager or boss who is

disengaged. In fact, in a story by US News and World Report, (http://bit.ly/1O7c5vT) it was revealed that, "Only 18 percent of managers at U.S. jobs had "high talent" for leadership skills, including the ability to encourage accountability in the workplace, motivate workers and build relationships with them." Sobering, isn't it?

Being engaged as a leader can't be phoned in, faked, nor neglected. If you want to lead on a level that engages your team then you have to be engaged with your people and be intentional about creating a culture in which your people can thrive.

Do you want to be an engaged leader? Just as Gen. Marshall took out the paint brush and went to work, so too must you roll up your sleeves and not be afraid to get your hands dirty. Get engaged and get involved with your people.

EXEMPLARY LEADERS TAKE RESPONSIBILITY

Maybe in some circles taking responsibility has become a lost art, but it still works. Upon arriving at Ft. Benning, Gen Marshall saw what had to be done and went to work. Beneath the dignity of a General? Maybe. Below his pay grade. No doubt. But exemplary leaders are not worried about eitherthey just see what needs to be done and get busy.

Peter Drucker said, "Rank does not confer privilege or give power. It imposes responsibility." And that is the essence of exemplary leaders. When you worry less about your title and position and more about the responsibilities that come with it the greater your impact you will have as a leader.

Do you want to be a responsible leader? Play the hand you are dealt. Find solutions and not fault. Set the example by being the example of what exemplary leadership is all about.

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Chris Brown to play in the East-West Shrine Game in advance of the NFL draft

He's a team leader, so Chris Brown found little solace in scoring a touchdown in a losing effort against Ohio State in the Fiesta Bowl, a game that featured two of college football's marquee programs.

The former Hanahan High School twosport star would have rather celebrated the victory, said farewell to his teammates of four years. Yes, Brown wanted a different ending, but he's not looking back as he takes the next step in his career, a potential date in the upcoming NFL draft.

"It hurts when you lose, it always does," Brown said. "But it is obviously a good way to go out. You want to win, but scoring a touchdown in a New Year's Day bowl against a team like Ohio State on a big stage is something I will remember."

Brown caught a 4-yard TD pass to cut the Ohio State lead to 28-21. But the Buckeyes weren't to be denied as they posted a 44-28 victory. It was a season of what might have been for both teams. Brown will get one more chance to showcase his talent before the NFL draft. The week of practices leading up to the all-star game are just as important because scouts will be in attendance all week, getting a chance to see the prospects in a one-on-one situation.

Brown is slated to graduate on time and his classes for spring semester are on Mondays and Wednesdays. That gives him ample time to travel from South Bend to Chicago for intense training for the NFL combine.

He is projected to be a fifth or sixth-round selection. But one practice, one game or one workout can changes a player's stock in a second. That's why academics were the big reason Brown selected Notre Dame on National Signing Day 2012.

"I was put in a great situation," Brown said. "Coming from the Charleston area, I was able to meet people from all over the United States, from Texas, Rhode Island, Miami and Boston. It allowed me to grow, to adapt to situations."

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Trout, Redfish, and skateboard bite has been pretty good



fishing trends

It is the middle of January and I have yet to catch a fish here (in the Lowcountry).

However, now that I am back from the Keys, I intend to set this right as soon as possible. In my absence, Elliott (my son) has been fishing a lot.

By all accounts, the Trout and Redfish bite has been pretty good. Falling water temperatures have Redfish in the shallows and Trout in deeper channels. These are their usual winter haunts, so the fish are now more predictable (and reasonably easy to catch).

Elliott reports bouncing a Z-Man MinnowZ Houdini on a quarter ounce jig slowly along the bottom has been effective for both Redfish and Trout. Using this technique, Elliott caught an unusual sort of inshore slam.

While casting to an oyster bar adjacent to a dock, he caught a Redfish in the shallows atop the bar. A few casts later, he caught a Trout at the base of the bar in about 10 feet of water. On the next cast to the base of the bar, Elliott caught a pink skateboard. We are not sure what to name this slam, as this is the first skateboard we have ever caught. In the hope of catching another one, Elliott carefully revived and released the skateboard back into the creek.

A lot people stop fishing in January. I do not recommend doing this. If the water remains in the middle fifty degree range, fishing will continue to be very good. So dress appropriately for the weather and go fishing. If you are really lucky, you just may catch an extremely elusive skateboard!


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Landing coveted bio gig, PEC columnist goes toe to toe with Mayor Joe

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Good fortune does not always coincide with good timing, even when that stroke of luck is matched with merit. But when you have the good fortune of being invited to pen the authorized biography of the man known as "America's mayor," you are willing to take do-able timing over that which is truly good.

And so, on December 10 at a special meet-the-author event at Halls Chophouse, award-winning Post and Courier journalist Brian Hicks introduced the finished product of his leap of faith (and race against the clock): "The Mayor: Joe Riley and the Rise of Charleston."

Hicks opened by praising the event's host for the outstanding lunch. "For the past year, I've been eating with Joe Riley... at Subway," he deadpanned. "I believe the mayor and I have eaten at every Subway franchise in the metropolitan and Columbia areas since January." Riley's

staff had warned Hicks that the mayor was a creature of habit. He had apparently gone nearly unbroken with lunches at The Colony House until the decades-old restaurant closed in the early 90s.

When initially approached about writing the biography, Hicks almost declined the offer. He was invited to the project in late October 2014, and was told the team wanted the book out before Riley left office at the end of 2015. That gave just over a year to store shelves, and production time alone averages about nine months. "So, that was my excuse," Hicks stated, "I said there wasn't going to be enough time." (As it turns out, by word count "The Mayor" is longer than any of the previous seven books he's authored.)

But Hicks concedes that his hesitation was less about the time constraints than it was about the subject matter. Hicks had done a story with the mayor within the journalist's first couple of weeks in Charleston and, from the start of their working relationship, had always found

him to be pleasant and forthcoming. But Joe Riley had always been very private about his personal life, a habit that was understandably concerning for the person doing the chronicling. Though Hicks had earned the privilege of contacting the mayor on his unpublished line for an "unvarnished" opinion on many matters, he was unsure that the mayor would be willing to go truly on-the-record for a meaningful biography. But apparently the mayor trusted Hicks and perceived their relationship as a well-founded, trusted one, because he gave the nod to the veteran political columnist after turning down offers from six other author hopefuls.

After a week's deliberation, Hicks decided to take the gig. What really sealed the deal was this: Hicks had learned from those close to Mayor Riley that after his first inauguration, the new holder of the City Hall keys and some of his buddies capped off the celebration with some latenight beer and cigars in the mayor's office.

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
Brian Hicks pens new biography on Mayor Riley

Hicks knew the mayor's reaction to this bit of dish would be indicative of just how open his bio subject would be in divulging stories and information. To Hicks' delight, when he approached Joe Riley, they mayor sputtered out, "Oh, that ain't all... we re-arranged all the furniture..." Said Hicks, "That's when I realized, there was going to be nothing off-limits for the book." He went further to state that, in the year of interviews, not once did the mayor refuse to answer a question or request that the author not include material in the manuscript.

At the onset of the project, Hicks dug into the P&C archives, and found that between 1975 and the fall of 2014, Mayor Joe Riley appeared in 20,000 of the paper's stories. The biographer read each one, and created a timeline with all the most notable headlines. It turned out to be 120 pages long. When he told the mayor about that four-decade outline, Riley responded, "I'd like to borrow that sometime." From the time writing on "The Mayor" commenced last December, Hicks was at his laptop from 9 a.m. to midnight seven days a week. And he was still working on his P&C column all the while.

Early on, Hicks pitched his approach to Riley like this: the book would be a biography, but it would really read as a modern history of Charleston, with Mayor Joe as the main character. "Make no mistake," Hicks told the crowd at Halls, "in the history of Charleston over the last 40 years, Joe Riley has been the main character." He focused on the mayor's efforts at

racial equality and social justice, and the revitalization of Charleston, recalling that those were the reasons he ran for the post in the first place.

Hicks also underscored the mayor's propensity to get on something, and stick with it. He "got on" Charleston Place a year after taking office, and ten years later the centerpoint hotel would open. He grabbed onto Waterfront Park, an idea he had in 1976 that did not come to fruition

until 1990. He had the notion of building the South Carolina Aquarium in 1982, and at the turn of the century the doors finally opened. And the first mention of the African-American Museum, which the mayor is still working on today, came in 2000. "It's the same pattern with everything he does," the author attests. "He doesn't give up. He's tenacious."

As the P&C's metro columnist, Hicks had spent a fair amount of time with Joseph P. Riley since joining the news outlet in 2007, establishing a strong rapport with Charleston's mayor. Hicks had, in fact, logged hours with a multitude of local and state politicians over those years. "I work with politicians every single day; it's pretty much what I do," he asserted. "Some of them I like a great deal; I consider some of them friends. And there's a lot of them I don't trust further than I could throw them. The mayor has always kind of been at a different level from all of

those people."

Hicks claims that the distinction is Riley's near-universal ability to command respect, simply by virtue of who he is and what he has stood for and accomplished. Still, Hicks contends that as much as he respects the mayor, he hasn't always agreed with him. "I've written columns against things that he's said... and I've heard from him every single time," the author related. "That's Joe Riley's standard operating procedure, the three-page, single-spaced letter, telling you why you're wrong and he's right." It apparently has been the mayor's modus operandi for at least 40 years; he argues that he's right, he tells you why he's right, he makes his case, and he states it over and over until the opposition just gives up. Observed Hicks, "That's how Charleston was built."
