What started as an idea amongst a group of friends wanting to support local businesses has turned into a community shopping and dining event benefiting the Campaign for the MUSC Shawn Jenkins Children's Hospital. Happening next week on Wednesday, June 22 from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m., islanders and friends of the island are invited to partake in the first annual Sip Shop Support.

"The ultimate goal of Sip Shop Support is to raise funds for the Campaign for the MUSC Shawn Jenkins Children's Hospital. In support of this goal, we are launching this event where our community will come together to stroll Daniel Island, shop the local businesses, browse a variety of guest artisans from the Charleston area, and share food and drink...all while supporting a great cause," says Lauren Hoffman, volunteer for the event.

The Daniel Island business district will be divided into four sections, each with its own entry point where shoppers will pay \$5 to participate and will receive an entry wristband, reusable cup, shopping bag, and passport/map. 

CHILDREN, TEENS AND GUN VIOLENCE

This week marks the first anniversary of the nine shootings at Emmanuel AME Church, and in December 2016 it will be four years since the shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary School where 20 children, ages six and seven, were killed. As a parent and grandparent, I know we all want our kids to grow up healthy and happy, and provide them with a safe place in which to grow. I don't own a gun and never had the desire to, but leaving politics aside, those who do own guns certainly bear a greater responsibility to the rest of us for keeping their weapons locked and out of reach.

"Be Smart" is an organization created by adults who want to reduce unintentional shootings that occur when guns are left within reach of kids http:// besmartforkids.org/ According to private analysis by EveryTownResearch.org American kids are 11 times more likely to die from gun violence than in other developed countries.

A Harvard study shows that 70% of children under age 10 know where their parents store their guns. Of these, 37% admit having handled the guns without their parents' knowledge. Each year in the US, nearly 100 children under the age of 17 die from unintentional shootings, and more than 400 commit suicide with a gun.

The headlines can make us feel helpless but according to the BE SMART moms, the SMART framework can prevent child gun deaths and inju-

Secure all guns in your home and vehicles; Model responsible behavior around guns; Ask about the presence of unsecured guns in their

Recognize the risks of teen suicide Tell our peers to be SMART.

When my children were little it would have never donned on me to ask another parent whether they owned a gun, much less whether they left it somewhere in their house, unattended, and within reach of my child. That would be like asking them if they were negligent parents. Not so, according to SMART moms. You can ease into that conversation just like you would ask whether they have a dog or cat, if your child had a fear of dogs or was allergic to cats. You would ask if there was a pool, especially if your child couldn't swim. Asking whether there's a gun in the house should be part of this conversation, especially in those parts of the country where many people are hunters or gun owners.

Teens living in households with guns are 22% more likely to die of gun violence. We know that adolescents are very impulsive, their brain is not yet fully developed. If they were bullied, or a girlfriend hurt them – they may feel dejected and the presence and availability of a gun in the house makes it too easy to end an unpleasant emotion. Fire arms are the most lethal method for suicide attempts, resulting in death 85% of the time. According to the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention, https://afsp.org/ those teens who attempt suicide do not attempt it again.

DI Safety Patrol: That's a wrap!

The pilot program of the Daniel Island Safety Patrol yielded many positive results, according to organizers, and helped curb potential crosswalk hazards for both students and drivers.

Close to 30 volunteers donated their time to serve on the patrol, which assisted hundreds of Daniel Island School children in crossing the intersection of Daniel Island Drive and Pierce Street each school day between April 11 and May 27. In addition to parents and other community members, Berkeley County School Board Member Mac McQuillin, State Senator Larry Grooms, Berkeley County Councilman Josh Whitley, and Berkeley County Sheriff Duane Lewis also stepped up to help. Coordinated by the Daniel Island Neighborhood Association (DINA), the patrol was initiated in response to several accidents and near misses involving kids and cars, including a collision between a student biker and a vehicle in a crosswalk on January 20.

The Daniel Island News asked Marie Delcioppo, DINA Safety Chair; Carina Buckman, School Safety Subcommittee Project Manager; and Glenn Williman, DINA President, to share their thoughts on the program and future plans.

Q: How would you summarize the effectiveness of the pilot program?

CARINA: Community feedback has been effusive! Drivers benefit as it becomes clearer when children will cross (with the big orange flag being

raised) and children benefit from supervision while crossing. Volunteers are also able to reinforce parent and school safety education (e.g. stop, look and listen before crossing, and requests to dismount bikes to cross).

MARIE: In the beginning - I'm not going to lie - we were nervous. We didn't know if we'd get enough volunteers or if the community in general

would be receptive to this idea. I am thrilled to admit we were completely wrong! The parents, children, safety patrol volunteers, elected officials, law enforcement, the school faculty and staff, the entire community rallied around this program. As I was crossing the street one day after school with a little boy with his grandmother, he reinforced to me why we need this program. He said, "Grandma, isn't is so cool we have these people helping us cross the street now?" And every single time I am out volunteering, kids and parents thank me. It's so touching and heartwarming. I can't thank the Daniel Island community enough. I get choked up just thinking about it.

Q: What message would you like to convey to vour volunteers?

CARINA: A huge thanks to everyone that pitched in to making the pilot a huge success and for their continued support after summer vacation! We were able to recruit 28 volunteers throughout the pilot which enables us to deem the program a success and sustainable in the longer term.

MARIE: We had about 28 volunteers, made up of parents of DIS students, parents of non-DIS students, retirees, grandparents, single folks with no kids... That variety of volunteers just shows how much this community genuinely cares about one another. On top of our tireless volunteers who always had a smile on their face, Berkeley County School Board Representative Mac McQuillin, Senator Larry Grooms, and Berkeley County Councilmen Josh Whitley wasted no time grabbing an orange flag and pitching in. And then there were all the folks "behind the scenes:" Principal Marty French and Vice Principal

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Sen. Grooms and Rep. Merrill deliver legislative update at June DINA meeting

It could have been called the Night of A Thousand Updates. Okay, maybe not a thousand, really, but it was a not-so-brief briefing on all things Daniel Island.

To his credit, Daniel Island Neighborhood Association (DINA) president Glenn Williman remained true to form in keeping a good clock on the June 7 meeting at Church of the Holy Cross. He rolled from old business to new business to featured speakers seamlessly, respectful of both guests' remarks and members' time.

TRAFFIC, PLANNING, AND PARKS WITH COUNCILMAN WHITE

City of Charleston Councilman Gary White noted that the City had received a number of complaints related to parking on the island, primarily too close in proximity to stop signs, mailboxes, and crosswalks. In response, an initiative was kicked off on May 18 to more closely monitor adherence to traffic guidelines and identify areas for better signage. White cautioned that an increase in parking citations could result.

Speaking next on two projects recently presented to City planning, White indicated that of the two potential apartment projects – one at

255 River Landing Drive and the other at 210 River Landing – only the former is currently moving forward, as the latter was denied by the Daniel Island Architectural Review Board and is likely to stall before the City as well.

Addressing island park space, Councilman White stated that the construction on restroom and picnic facilities at Freedom Park is expected to be completed in early September. He also shared that draft agreements between the City and the Department of Natural Resources related to the Daniel Island boat landing are expected to be on the July 19 City Council agenda. Improvements to the trails on the island have been completed, and the shoreline stabilization project is expected to commence toward the end of this year with completion in early 2017. The City is waiting on the Department of Transportation's feedback related to the bike path between St. Thomas Island and Daniel Island, and White is hopeful the project will be out for bid in the third quarter of 2016.

Regarding the Parks and Recreation needs assessment that was conducted last year, White stated that a first draft should be ready to present to the community soon. He also shared that consultants for the City have been working on "schematics" for a new island community center, and details to share with residents are forthcoming, though no timetable has been set.

Williman added that DINA will likely form a new committee to track the progress of the Daniel Island recreation/community center, and anyone interested in serving on that task force should contact him at president@dineighborhoodassociation.org.

COMMITTEES OLD AND NEW

Clyde Rush, DINA's Land Use and Zoning committee chair, reported that the City's

Technical Review Committee had recently taken a first look at a hotel to be constructed at the corner of Fairchild Street and River Landing Drive. Rush also reminded the group that updates are always posted to DINA's website (dineighborhoodassociation.org), and Williman indicated that a "snapshot" of current island projects would be included in an upcoming "DINA Dashboard" column in the Daniel Island

Safety Committee chair Marie Delcioppo offered kudos and thanks for all the volunteers and supporters of the successful school safety patrol program at Daniel Island School. She noted that the spring-launched initiative had 25 volunteers during its first run, and with the addition of more manpower, she hopes to add another intersection to the pilot location of Daniel Island Drive and Pierce Street this fall. Remarked Williman of the hard work invested in the school safety program, "This is a concrete example of getting something done."

The DINA president then shared that he had been contacted by ten members interested in serving on a new "Transition Committee," which would be charged with exploring the "ins and outs" of Daniel Island evolving from a developer-controlled community to a residentcontrolled community over the next two to five

years. The committee would work closely with the Daniel Island Property Owners Association, ideally meeting with the POA on a monthly basis. Williman also mentioned that DINA and the POA hope to jointly sponsor a special meeting to update the community on the Seven Farms Drive/Daniel Island Drive intersection early this fall.

A WORD FROM TEAM 5

Officers from Charleston Police Department's Team 5 on Daniel Island reported that the spike in property crime, particularly vehicle theft and theft from vehicles, has subsided over the last few weeks. The officers shared that in all cases arrests have been made or suspects identified, and that in nearly all instances, the crimes were perpetrated by juveniles that were either from Daniel Island or associated with residents of Daniel Island. They also noted that every case likely could have been prevented by locked doors or secured vehicles; one recent suspect was found with a backpack containing four sets of car keys that had been obtained "without a single broken window." Lastly, the officers noted that traffic enforcement would be ramped up during the summer months as kids are biking and walking the island more during time off from school.

STATE LEGISLATURE 411

Following a colorful introduction by DINA vice president Bob Graham, South Carolina Senator Larry Grooms and South Carolina Representative Jim Merrill took the podium. Each took a few moments to speak about the capacity in which they serve in the state government, as well as recent legislative activity.

Rep. Merrill, a 16-year member of the General Assembly, stated that he is a member of the House Ways and Means Committee, which is responsible for budget writing. With a \$7.5 billion budget this year, Merrill expressed that having a surplus creates "an absolute free-forall, an all-out frenzy" related to determining how those excess dollars will be spent. The wide scope of funding to address, broken down to the "minutia" of allocations, results in a time consuming process that Merrill said yielded "alright" results last month. He did note that spending never exceeds income, as the state adheres to its constitutional balanced budget requirement. "We don't do what Washington did. We don't go into debt," Merrill explained. "You take a lot of heat for that sometimes, but I'll tell you what, it keeps your bond ratings in good stead." He likened state government to a battleship, remarking that it doesn't turn on a

dime, and that the needs and logic of one part of over the state's "Infrastructure Bank." the state don't mirror those of another.

Though grateful for the "honor to serve" and optimistic regarding the way forward for the state, Sen. Grooms lamented that "the political discourse in Washington has sort of filtered its way down to South Carolina." Still, as the most recent two-year session of the General Assembly wrapped up two weeks ago, one bill that was able to pass was that related to roads. Grooms, Chairman of the Senate Transportation Committee, remarked that it was no small feat to get 170 "highly opinionated" members of the General Assembly to move the roads bill forward. The next day, June 8, Governor Nikki Haley signed the bill into law.

To begin to fix the state's deteriorating roads, the bill provides for \$200 million per year from the general fund to the Department of Transportation, in addition to another \$2.2 billion borrowed, over the next decade. Most immediately, the funds would pay for repair of the nine worst "chokepoints" in the state; two of such projects are in the Charleston area: widening I-26 to three lanes to just past new Volvo plant and widening I-526 to three lanes from Clements Ferry Road to Long Point Road. In addition, 399 structurally deficit bridges will be repaired, and \$1 billion will be spent to improve highways and secondary roads. The bill also calls for the governor to appoint the members of the commission that oversees the Transportation Department, and shifts to her office more power

The Senator said this allows for decisionmaking based on real priorities, not politics. "That's a step in the right direction for the state of South Carolina... We took a giant step forward with this roads bill," concluded Grooms, adding, "but it's certainly not the destination of where we want to be."

Sen. Grooms mentioned that he and Rep. Merrill are also chair and co-chair, respectively, of the oversight board for the SCPA, and the two played a critical role in passing legislation to deny the Ports Authority the right to build a Daniel Island-based terminal. While spoil cells for dredge material will remain on 900 of the 1,300 acres of SCPA-owned land to accommodate Charleston's 52-feet harbor deepening project, Sen. Grooms and Rep. Merrill are working with the Ports Authority to obtain regulatory permission to utilize another portion of the property for a creek restoration and saltwater mitigation bank. And announced late last summer was the transfer of a key 50-acre parcel on the island's south side to the South Carolina Department of Parks, Recreation, and Tourism a move intended to safeguard the Daniel Island land from a future risk of terminal construction by cutting off the SCPA's access. The legislators have indicated that, ideally, the land would be developed into "active" recreation space.

The next meeting of the Daniel Island Neighborhood Association will take place on September 6.

Child safety in the active school zone has been a hot button for a while and by pulling together as a community we have made a positive change, that was so worth all the effort!

MARIE: I don't know as though I "learned" this, but it was definitely reinforced: Where there's a will, there's a way. Carina Buckman, Angelique Clarke, An Kelly, Daniel Island School, and Mac McQuillin wanted to see something done to help our children get to and from school safer, and they were not going to stop until something happened. I am so honored to serve with these community leaders who saw an issue and, together, worked to implement a solution. Our feeling was that the worst case scenario was that this program tanked. If so, we scratch it and go back to the drawing board. (You never know if something is going to succeed or fail until you try it, right?!) But at least we were taking positive action. Fortunately, we didn't have to face that worst case scenario, because this program proved itself and will continue next school year.

Q: What is the future of the program?

CARINA: We plan to continue the program at the intersection of Daniel Island Drive and Pierce Street after summer vacation (as long as we can maintain enough volunteers) and will then consider expanding to Pierce Street and Barfield Street (if we can get enough additional volunteers). We will also assist parents of children attending the new school to assess feasibility of implementing a similar program.

MARIE: We have even more volunteers joining us next school year and plan to continue the program at the same intersection of Daniel

I look forward to continuing and expanding the program in the next school year.

Q: Is there anything else you would like to add?

CARINA: Thanks once again for everyone's support in getting this pilot off the ground and making it a success. While this is a DINA led program, the partnership with DIS has been invaluable! We also very much appreciate support from our local officials, including Senator Larry Grooms, School Board representative Mac McQuillin and Councilman Josh Whitley. And thanks of course to The Daniel Island News for helping with community communications!

MARIE: There simply are not words to express my gratitude and appreciation. It's one thing for all us grown-ups to think this Safety Patrol Program is a great idea, but when the kids are excited to have us there helping them get to and from school safely, it just warms my heart. It's the best feeling in the world.

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It's Not About the Mission Statement

Clients do not come first. Employees come first. If you take care of your employees, they will take care of the clients. – Richard Branson

Writing for Talent Management and HR (http://bit.ly/1KWCe2t), John Hollon cites a survey concerning the state of employee engagement. Among his finding that employers need to pay attention to include: More than 54 percent of employees have felt frustrated about work; only 38 percent of workers strongly agree that their manager has established a strong working relationship with them; some forty percent say they don't get their company's vision, or worse yet, have never seen it; nearly 67 percent of American workers can name at least one thing that would prevent them from taking any kind of risk at work.

Intuitively, many leaders know that employee engagement is critical to the success of their organization. Sadly, many employees feel that their leaders in management are out of touch. In fact, forty percent in the cited survey said they don't get their company's vision or haven't even seen it. How is this possible?

Let's be clear- a mission or vision statement hanging on a wall in some obscure place in the break room is not employee engagement. Yes, a mission statement is important. It's important that your employees understand your vision and the role they play in seeing it fulfilled. But that alone will not suffice.

At times this is a concept lost on many leaders. Crystalizing a key point on this topic is the former president of Starbucks International, Howard Behar. In his book, It's Not About The Coffee, he writes, "At Starbucks we're in the human service business, not the customer service business." That's the distinction. Behar adds, "I've always said, we're not in the coffee business serving people, we're in the people business serving coffee."

Employee engagement begins with leadership engagement. Employee engagement begins with leaders who are engaged in the lives of the people who make the mission of the work possible. It's that simple and it's that difficult. It takes work. It means that as a leader you have to come out from behind your desk and get connected to your people. So what does leadership engagement look like and what are some core characteristics? Here are three for your consideration.

LEADERSHIP ENGAGEMENT IS PROACTIVE.

So long as your approach to employee engagement is a reactionary one – one that responds only during a crisis- it does not

qualify as a model of employee engagement. Leadership engagement, for example, says that the health and well-being of your people is important and an investment in them and will include a wellness program because you know that when your employees are healthy they will be more productive.

There are many ways to be proactive and engage your employees but sitting back and waiting to put out the next fire is not one of them. Your mission statement means little to your people so long as your commitment to them is an afterthought.

LEADERSHIP ENGAGEMENT IS **PERSONAL**

A smart leader understands that people are your most appreciable asset. You can have the best business plan in the world, and the best mission statement to go along with it, but without people you are going nowhere. Leaders who excel at employee engagement understand this principle and take to heart the importance of building meaningful relationships. Your connection to your customer/ clients flows through your employees. It's so much easier for your employee to advocate for your brand and your product when the relationship with its leadership is strong.

Make it a practice of your leadership to get to know your people and build relationships. At the end of the day your people want to know that you care about them and not just the bottom line.

LEADERSHIP ENGAGEMENT IS A **PRACTICAL**

Employee engagement works best when at the end of the day it's practical. Your engagement with your people is critical but is it must be practical in its application. For example; if communication within your organization is lacking and information is not reaching the right people in a timely fashion; a workshop on retirement options on Monday at 9 a.m. may not be the most urgent event on the calendar.

Leadership engagement is all about knowing the pulse of your organization, understanding the needs of your people, and cutting through the layers of bureaucracy to get results. Never underestimate the power of being practical.

Employee engagement issues will continue to be front and center in most organizations. There is always room for improvement. A commitment to employee engagement begins when leaders are engaged with their people.


Planned for Island Park Drive are Central Island Square, an upscale residential/restaurant complex; a Refuel Gas Station; and the proposed Daniel Island Performing Arts Center. In Daniel Island Park, construction continues on Wharf 7, a luxury apartment community that will feature a 9,000 square foot clubhouse, an outdoor amphitheater, and a dog park. Neighboring Wharf 7 will be Daniel Pointe Retirement Community, an independent living facility; and Well-More of Daniel Island, an assisted living facility that is expected to include Alzheimer's care. In addition, Blackbaud recently issued an announcement that the company will be building a brand new, 360,000 square foot campus on two sites bordering River Landing Drive.

The surge in development investments on the island is likely to result in strong returns for the community, noted Pete Harper, of Lee & Associates.

"The new commercial developments focused around Island Park Drive will most likely cost in excess of \$150 million and they are all within a quarter of a mile of the downtown retail district," said Harper, who is serving as leasing agent for the Central Island Square development. "That's big money for Daniel Island. These new developments, plus the newly completed Simmons Park Apartments, will provide nearly 1,400 residential living units within a short walk of downtown. This residential growth will be a huge boost for our existing retailers and restaurants and will drive the addition of other new and exciting retailers. There is lots of money being spent on Daniel Island construction right now which will ultimately lead to more disposable dollars spent in our community."

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
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Flying Fish win first two meets

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Bishop England wins the Director's Cup

Van Buren drafted, Hanahan and BE to play in Sertoma

The Bishop England athletic program was once again named tops in the state for Class AA schools.

The Bishops were recently awarded the South Carolina Athletic Administration Association Director's Cup. It has been presented annually to the most successful athletic department of each of the High School League's four classifications and includes 11 boys' and 11 girls' sports.

It was a case of the song remaining the same as the Bishops won for the 14th consecutive year. Not too shabby because the award has only been in existence for 14 years.

The Bishops did it in style for the 2015-16 academic year, winning a school best eight state titles.

The Bishops won state titles in boys' and girls' soccer, boys' track and field, volley-

ball, girls' lacrosse, girls' basketball, girls' tennis and girls' golf.

The girls' lacrosse and girls' golf titles were achieved for the first time in history. The girls' basketball team won a state title for the third straight year and fourth in last five years. The invincible volleyball team tied a national record with its 16th straight state title.

The Director's Cup uses a points system to decide the winners.

For example, teams earn 100 points for a state championship, 80 for runner-up, 60 for a third-place finish all the way down to 10 points for a 32nd-place finish in the state.

Bishop England also won state titles in rugby and ice hockey. But those titles don't count in the Cup race because the sports aren't sanctioned by the High School League.

Wando won the Class AAAA award. Hilton Head claimed the Class AAA title while St. Joseph's was best in Class A.

Next year will present more of a challenge for Bishop England, which will compete at the Class AAA level in the new five-class system.

VAN BUREN DRAFTED

It was a case of good news, bad news for Hanahan standout pitcher Malcolm Van Buren.

The good news was that he was drafted by the Kansas City Royals in the Major League Baseball Draft on June 10. He was taken in the 31st round and was the 943rd pick, overall.

Earlier in the day, Van Buren announced on his Twitter account that he faces Tommy John surgery.

"Last Monday, I discovered that I have to undergo Tommy John surgery," Van

Buren tweeted. "This has come as a very big surprise to both myself and those close to me."

Van Buren went 5-3 in his senior season with the Hawks with a 1.92 ERA and 65 strikeouts in 47.1 innings pitched.

He signed with North Carolina State and was headed to play for the Wolfpack. He hasn't made a final decision about pro or college, but it is certain that he will have a rehab process that could take at least a year.

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


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
