



Beresford Creek Landing residents make the case for new traffic light

A standing room only crowd packed in to the Beresford Creek Landing Clubhouse on October 20 hoping to put the brakes on traffic dangers at the intersection leading in to their neighborhood off Clements Ferry Road.

The group had an opportunity to share their concerns with South Carolina Department of Transportation Chair Jim Rozier, who was invited to speak with residents at the request of Berkeley County Councilman Josh Whitley (District 2). The community expressed to Rozier that a traffic light at the entrance to their subdivision is critically needed to prevent accidents, as well as other headaches continually experienced by drivers attempting to

"It was a good meeting," said Rozier, after the session. "They definitely have a need for a traffic light at that intersection. "...And it would be

a major help for the trucking company next door. They have a terrible time getting in and out."

Rozier added that since the meeting he has been to Columbia to speak with his colleagues about the light and that it is now under consideration. Both state and federal laws require that the project be officially "justified," he said, before it can move forward.

"Since the last time that they looked at justification for that light, traffic on Clements Ferry Road has significantly increased, and it continues to increase every day. I'm not sure Beresford Run (alone) would justify the light, but the amount of traffic on Clements Ferry Road and the number of school buses coming out of that subdivision, and the trucks next door, I'm pushing for all of that together to be the justification...But it's not going to happen tomorrow morning. We will have to push to get it done as quickly as possible, and I will."

Whitley also spoke at the meeting


and expressed his thanks to Rozier for taking part.

"I was honored to have the Chairman of the SCDOT in my district and listening and educating us," said Whitley. "... The great turnout indicates alone the importance of this issue and public interest. I hope this will move that project along much sooner than otherwise, as I believe it is a grave safety concern for those residents."

Whitley is also in the midst of planning a public town hall with local and state officials to address growing traffic concerns all along the Clements Ferry Road corridor. A date for the program has yet to be set, but Whitley said he will announce the details once they are confirmed. According to the SCDOT website, construction on the first phase of the Clements Ferry Road widening project is scheduled to begin in 2016 with a completion date in 2020.

How Many Bumps Have You Had Today?

We expect so much. We expect our hours and days to run smoothly, when indeed we know

I call it the "Theory of Six Bumps," and it's a simple premise: each day will surprise us with six bumps, that is, events that we don't anticipate but must deal with nonetheless. The dog gets sick and does her business on the carpet (bump #1) . . . a friend desperately needs a ride to drop off his car (bump #2) . . . on our way to the office, we realize that we forgot one critical piece for the afternoon meeting (bump #3).

Bumps, of course, come in all shapes and sizes (misplaced keys, traffic at a standstill on 526), and if we're lucky, most bumps will be insignificant. Certain ones will take over our lives

for a stretch (e.g., sickness and weather-related tragedies), but the true casualty is our dream for a bump-free day. Perhaps it's time to revise that dream. Instead of anticipating a day free of mishaps (hope springs eternal), embrace the notion that, each day, they'll be six bumps (some more demanding than others). Rest assured, they're coming.

Some time ago I shared the Theory of Six Bumps with my sister, and less than 48 hours later she called and reported, "Well, I've already had my six bumps today." It was 10:30 in the morning (ouch!). As best I can recall, the bumps involved a parking ticket, a broken coffee pot and a computer glitch, a challenging mix if you asked me. I immediately thought to myself, then shared with my sister: "Well, it looks like you're clear for the rest of the day." Fortunately she laughed, then recounted the frustrating details of her morn-

Some days I give voice to my bumps. Rushing to a morning meeting, I spot a traffic jam up ahead. Inside I'm thinking: "Bump #1". Hours later, in the checkout line, I discover that I don't have my credit card (bump #2) because I gave it

to my daughter (an altogether different kind of bump). Once home, I realize that I've neglected to shut off the outside water valve and discover that the water line has burst (bump #3, and a sizable one at that).

Of late, one particular bump stands out: it was Saturday morning, nearing 9:30 a.m., when Roe and I heard a strange noise emanating from the air vent. Within minutes we realized that an animal was trapped in the duct system and as my frustration began to mount, that this Saturday was about to disappear, I smiled to myself and said aloud: "Ah, bump #1." Six hours later the problem was resolved (we'll call this a "multi-hour bump"). And while frustration was still a part of my profile, the recognition helped immensely.

Might a bump-free day lie in your future? Not likely. So just sit back and relax – and count 'em if you wish. But know this - the bumps will arrive again tomorrow . . . and the day after that.

Embrace 'em. It'll make life a heckuva lot





Pay it forward campaign for The Music Battery raises \$5K

The talented young performers in The Music Battery drum line will soon have even more resources to take their beat to the streets, thanks to a Daniel Island effort inspired by an act of kindness.

The non-profit after school program, created by Black Tie Music Academy's Braeden Kershner and Kris Manning, recently received a generous \$5,200 gift sparked by a "GoFundMe" campaign initiated by Daniel Island resident Laura Mendola.

After Mendola's daughter, Bryce Seibuhr, received a new piano from Black Tie Music Academy last summer, she was inspired to "pay it forward" as a way to thank Kershner and Manning for their generosity. Seibuhr, who suffers from a chronic pain condition, often played the free public piano outside BTMA at night as an escape from her illness. When Siebuhr discovered the piano broken on one of her visits, she left a note for Kershner and Manning asking if it might

be possible for the piano to be fixed. The pair invited Seibuhr to the academy the next day and told her they would not only be donating a new piano to her for use in her home, but that she also would be receiving complimentary piano lessons from BTMA.

When Mendola learned about The Music Battery, she decided to launch the "Go-FundMe" account to raise money for the program. Soon, she received word that the Daniel Island Community Fund (DICF) would match all donations received up to \$2500. Last week, at a special concert celebrating the Music Battery's first anniversary, the DICF presented a check to Manning and Kershner. The "GoFundMe" campaign, combined with the DICF donation, resulted in a \$5200 contribution to the program.

"The Music Battery is about cooperation, self confidence, perseverance and being a part of something bigger than yourself," said Manning. "To see the community step up and show the kids, first-hand, that it supports them through a successful fundraiser



"I got a little emotional when I was speak-



Under a new big cheese, Orlando's takes larger slice of DI pie

Have any doubt that a pizza joint can become a town icon? Ask a Daniel Islander standing anywhere from Church of the Holy Cross to Daniel Island Animal Hospital what that heavenly smell is, and they'll know. Inquire of any island tailgater or pool partier where all the massive slices of gooey pie came from, and they'll answer in a heartbeat. Ask a resident where that line of kids in Bishop England uniforms is heading at noon on any given weekday, and they'll tell you. And those colorful square boxes in hundreds of island recycling bins every Thursday stump no one around here.

When Orlando's Brick Oven Pizza opened its doors at 295 Seven Farms Drive in September 2004, the landscape of Daniel Island became more delicious. David Orlando had spent the previous three years cooking in Italy, and jumped at the opportunity to open an authentic pizzeria in a developing community. The space was a great corner unit of a building that marked

the entrance of the town center from the residential south side of the island. In just 30 days, the chef-entrepreneur had his ovens fired and was slinging pies for dine-in and carry-out.

Whether the new island resident knew it or not at the time, the day would come when his pizzeria would outgrow its digs.

In 2014, Orlando's acquired the suite next door and began an expansion and renovation project that would take the eatery to the next level, with added dining and kitchen space, a new bar, a rear patio, and other new amenities and venue offerings.

It was an exciting time, to be sure, but about halfway through the work, in the summer of 2015, longtime general manager Jonathan Dearing left Orlando's to relocate to the northeast. Considering the volume of changes happening at the restaurant, this left a void that needed to be filled expeditiously, but very thoughtfully.

Brandon Fleskes was with Hall's Hospitality Group, and had been running Rita's Seaside Grille on Folly Beach. A resident of Daniel Island, Fleskes was one of Orlando's regular customers, and learned of the open GM seat. "David and I started talking about me coming over and where we would like to see the business go," Fleskes recalled of the initial discussion that ultimately led to him taking the managerial mantle. "We complete each other very well and have the same goals in

mind."

The pathway to some of those goals had already been paved with the expansion, but others would come about as the renovations revealed exciting new potential for Orlando's Brick Oven Pizza. On Becoming a Relevant Leader

There are times when a leader must move out ahead of the flock, go off in a new direction, confident that he is leading his people the right way. - Nelson Mandela

When Irving S. Olds was chairman of the U.S. Steel Corporation, he arrived for a stockholders' meeting and was confronted by a woman who asked, "Exactly who are you and what do you do?" Without batting an eye, Olds replied, "I am your chairman. Of course, you know the duties of a chairman--that's someone who is roughly the equivalent of parsley on a platter of fish."

The pretense in Irving S. Olds answer may have satisfied the inquisitive woman, but it is a relevant question for leaders today. Understandably, the people you lead need to know who you are and what you do. If not, they will not follow you. But beyond that, it's imperative that you know the answer.

The fact is, every leader wants to be relevant. I've yet to meet a leader who did not want to be at his or her best and make an impact. The issue of relevance however is not about satisfying your ego or building yourself up at the expense of knocking someone else down.

The measure of your relevance as a leader may be open to subjective interpretation by some people. That being said, the measure of your relevance is not about how others see you but how you answer these four questions. It's not an exhaustive set of questions by which to gauge your relevance as a leader but it's a good place to start.

Do I know my "why?"

Simon Sinek popularized the idea in his book, Start With Why, and it has revolutionized the lives of many with the discovery. So the question is, "Why do I do what I do?" Put another way, "What drives and inspires you?" It's a question every leader must answer.

Until you know the answer it will be hard to lead and consequently it will be hard to be relevant. Unless you know the "why" of your life in leadership it will be difficult for others to know why they should follow you. Being relevant in the lives of the people you lead begins by being honest with yourself. Know your "why".

Are my values clear?

Having a clear set of values is what keeps you grounded as a leader. When your values are clear then decision-making becomes much easier. Values-based decisions are made not by what is expedient or popular but by a governing set of principles.

Unfortunately, some leaders fall into the trap of confusing being popular for being relevant. The two could not be more different. If you want to be relevant as a leader in the 21st century then be a leader with a clear set of values and stick to them. If your values are not clear then your leadership will be uncertain. Relevance begins with clearly defined values.

Am I building relationships?

Leaders are busy people. I get it. But the day you become too busy to connect and build relationships with your people is the day you become irrelevant in their eyes. Building relationships is time consuming and is hard work. But consider the consequences if you don't.

Your relevance as a leader is tied to your ability and desire to build relationships with the people you lead. The greater the desire and effort the greater relevance and impact you will have. It's not complicated. I realize you will not have deep personal relationships with everyone on your team, but as a leader you should always remember that people are your most appreciable asset. How you connect and build relationships will make a world of difference. If you want to be relevant to your people get connected to them. There are no shortcuts.

Am I still growing?

Your ability to connect and be relevant with your people hinges on your growth and development as a leader. How are you growing the leader within you? The simple truth is this: you can't give what you don't have. If you are not growing as a leader your relevance as a leader will suffer

Be proactive and intentional in your growth as a leader. Make reading good leadership books a priority, find good leadership podcast to listen to, and subscribe to good magazines to read such as Success. Your growth and development as a leader will set you apart as a leader. Your relevance as a leader depends on it.

COMMEMORATE VETERANS with 'bios of the banner brave' on Daniel

Colonel Emily Desrosier and Colonel William McArdle: "One team – one fight!"

pouses share many things in life, to be sure, but few are professionally honored in tandem. Daniel Island residents and husband and wife military team Colonel William (Bill) McArdle and Colonel Emily Desrosier are an esteemed exception: they each occupy one side on a Daniel Island Exchange Club honor banner. Emily is currently serving in the Air National Guard, a department of the Air Force, and Bill retired in 2013 after serving for over 36 years in both the Air Force and the Air National Guard.

Previously assigned to the 106th Rescue Wing, Westhampton Beach, New York, Colonel Emily Desrosier served in various roles including Medical Administrative Officer, Logistics Readiness Officer, and Wing Executive Officer. As the Airfield Support Coordination Officer for the NASA Space Shuttle mission, she was tasked with coordinating an emergency landing site for all Shuttle missions in the event the spacecraft's launch was forced to abort.

Among Colonel Desrosier's overseas deployments were several missions in Germany and the United Kingdom, as well as an assignment in Incirlik, Turkey in support of Operation Northern Watch. Her numerous Air Force installations in the U.S. included a support role following the TWA Flight 800 disaster and assistance in leading a site security team at Ground Zero days after the 9/11 attack on the World Trade

Center in New York City.

Colonel Desrosier continues to serve faithfully and proudly. She is currently assigned to the 107th Airlift Wing out of Niagara Falls, New York, and is the commander of the wing's medical group. At a top level, she is charged with leading and managing the 107th medical professionals to ensure its military members are "fit to fight." With a focus on strategic planning and establishment of policies and procedures, Colonel Desrosier aims for effective health care services, budget formulation, and the establishment of critical health care committees, boards, and councils.

Colonel Bill McArdle's served multiple heroic deployments, including support of Operation Southern Watch at Ali Al Salem Air Base, Kuwait, as well as to the Helmand Province of Afghanistan as the first USAF Colonel assigned to the Combat Search and Rescue (CSAR) mission. He was the Air Force Central Command "boots-on-ground" lead at Camp Bastion/ Leatherneck, Joint Operating Base, where the 2,400 casualty evacuation missions for which his unit was responsible resulted in over 750 lives saved. He was also a responder in support of the 9/11 attacks in New York City

Colonel McArdle's final assignment prior to retirement two years ago was as Vice Wing Commander of the 106th Rescue Wing in Westhampton Beach, New York, where he served as the Chief Operating Officer and directed all aspects of a modern combat rescue Wing equipped with HC-130 fixed wing aircraft and HH-60G helicopter aircraft.

Bill and Emily credit the Air National Guard with bringing them together, as they were both assigned to the same base in New York. Neither would have imagined that years later, he would surprise Emily with a banner in her honor, and she would surprise Bill right back by having him honored on the other side of it.

Today, the couple lives on Daniel Island, enjoying Lowcountry life and the freedoms that they themselves have helped to secure. Bill is a member of the Daniel Island Exchange Club, and they are both mentors for senior class members at The Citadel. Their daughter Jacqueline attends the College of Charleston and daughter Kristyn is an English literature teacher in Oklahoma.

Summit Place residents share life stories in The Days of Not So Long Ago


Tony was in tenth grade in 1944 when the Army took him out of school to serve in the war. Lucille was selected to dance with the Rockettes in New York City in 1947. Betty's husband worked on the Manhattan Project in Tennessee, helping to create the atomic bomb that would eventually be dropped on Hiroshima (neither knew what he was actually working on at the time). Minnie graced many a Southern stage singing and playing the guitar while growing up in the 1940s.

These are just snippets from four of the 15 life stories shared in Crystal Klimavicz's newly released book The Days of Not So Long Ago. Klimavicz, a Daniel Island resident, was inspired to write the book while spending time as a volunteer at Summit Place on Daniel Island, where each of her subjects now resides. One day, while playing a game of "Hangman" with several residents, she heard a few women talking about an event they all remembered from their youth. The residents, most of them in their 90s, lived through a time during World War II when families put darkening curtains on their windows so enemy planes would not see the lights from their homes. They had trouble recalling the vowels to use in the game that day, and yet their memories of this childhood experience were sharper than ever.

"They were talking about blackout curtains," said Klimavicz. "All of sudden they started having this conversation and they kind of looked to the windows in the room. I could see that they were thinking and then this conversation ensued and it was just amazing! I walked out the door and I stood outside and thought 'Oh my goodness! There are just so many stories to tell!""

Klimavicz, who has published two other novels - Falling Through Trees and This Side of Perfect - decided she wanted to find a way to use her writing skills to give back, not only to the families of the residents she would feature, but also to those growing up in today's world. Once she got the go ahead from Summit Place, and a list of names of residents who might be interested and willing to share their stories, she

got to work. Over the next several months, she spent hours with each subject, learning about their lives, their experiences, their relationships, and more. Familv members helped fill in additional details. The Daniel

Island Historical Society also stepped up to partner with Klimavicz on the project.

"My main goal for the residents was to try to make sure that I captured the essence of how they felt about their lives," she said. "My main goal for the reader was to try to teach people, particularly the children, the newer generation, that the world is so different from what it used to be, and it really wasn't that long ago. So I was trying to balance both of those."

"We're excited that Crystal partnered with our community on this project," added Sean Davis, executive director at Summit Place. "Summit Place of Daniel Island serves a diverse body of residents with unique life experiences; each resident contributes differently to this community. Crystal's book captures many of these life experiences with dignity and relevant insight. Her storytelling rightfully serves as an important testament to their uniqueness and personal contributions.'

The collection of short stories offers poignant glimpses into 15 very different lives, but many have similar threads. As Klimavicz explains on the book's back cover, they are "Southerners and Northerners, men and women, the well-to-do, and those who have struggled - all people who have lived 80 to 90 years, and have seen our world undergo amazing and radical

changes." They each grew up during the Great Depression, and for some it was sometimes a struggle to keep food on the table.

"They saw civil rights at its worst moments and lived during a time when children had to walk for miles to school (yes, just as some of our parents used to lament)," wrote Klimavicz in the book. "And...they spoke to adults only when spoken to. It was a simpler era when people had very little yet appreciated everything."

In The Days of Not So Long Ago, Klimavicz worked tirelessly to weave in facts about the places her subjects lived and worked.

"What was so wonderful was when I went back and read them their stories, I taught them things they didn't know!" said Klimavicz.

In the book's forward, Klimavicz explains another more personal reason for wanting to see these special stories come to light. She recalls her own family gatherings as a young child, when she would sit captivated at her grandfather's feet to hear stories from his past. When he passed away many years later, "all of those stories" went with him, never captured in writing, said Klimavicz. That memory, coupled with her experiences at Summit Place, ignited a passion to see that the stories of "the greatest generation" stay with us forever. Unfortunately,

Lucille, one of her subjects in The Days of Not So Long Ago, passed away before the story was published. Thankfully, it is now preserved on the book's pages for her family.

Klimavicz is hopeful that all of the stories contained in the book will inspire others to remember a special time in history that still can offer up valuable lessons today.

"Although our society and our culture certainly gains through technology and advances and scientific breakthroughs, we also lose," she said. "And part of what I feel we've lost is... (back then) the respect that younger people gave elders was automatic. It was never questioned. The manners. The politeness. The customs of that era were based around family and respect... There are still such great qualities from our past that we need not to forget."

The book was published last month and already is receiving positive reviews, she added. It is currently available at Island Expressions on Daniel Island, the Daniel Island Sales Center, and via amazon.com. A special community book launch reception is planned at Summit Place for Friday, November 6, from 4 to 5 p.m. (anyone interested in attending can do so by sending an RSVP to Klimavicz at crystalak16@ gmail.com).


"I feel honored and grateful that I was able to capture these stories for the residents themselves and their families, and particularly for Lucille," added Klimavicz. "For the general public...I would hope that people would be inspired to learn more about our history and our past."

Redfish have an interesting life history. As iuveniles, they live in creeks and grow very quickly. After a couple of years, the small fish grow into slot-size (15 to 23 inches) young adults. They remain in the rivers and creeks until they grow to about 27 inches or so. At which time, the now adult fish migrate to deeper inshore and nearshore waters. However, on occasion, a few of the adult fish do not get this memo. This was the case on a recent fishing trip for Kevin McMurtry and Ed Marinaro.

Ed and Kevin were casting PaddlerZ lures on eighth ounce flutter hooks to a broken grass and shell shoreline. Ed felt a solid thump and set the hook on a monster inshore Redfish. By all accounts, it was an epic battle but Ed's angling skill eventually won the day. The Redfish was 35+ inches and weighed 15 pounds, an unusually large fish for the creeks. Well done guys!

King tides made fishing this week a bit challenging. The tough conditions were compounded by lingering water clarity issues from the flood. I am happy to report that both

of these events are for the most part behind us. Tides have returned to normal levels and the water is significantly clearer. This is good news for anglers.

Trout and Redfish are schooling up and feeding aggressively. Additionally, Flounder are abundant as well. It is a great time to go fishing. While we are blessed with an excellent vear round fishery, November is probably my favorite month to fish. The weather is pleasant and the fish are hungry!

Hawks top Berkeley, clinch ADHD Coaching WORKS! Here on DI second place in the region

Friday night game against Hilton Head will determine the region champ

What began on a hot summer day in Hanahan will conclude on a crisp fall night Friday in Hilton Head.

The Hanahan Hawks opened football camp this season with numerous goals including a Region 8-AAA championship. All the blood, sweat and tears the Hawks have put into the season will be on the table when they travel to Hilton Head for a game Friday night that will be for the all the Region 8-AAA marbles.

The Hawks clinched at least second place in the region with a 35-18 victory over Berkeley county rival – and defending region champ – Berkeley at the friendly confines of Wiley Knight Stadium. Now the Hawks must be road warriors

The Hawks, who have reeled off four consecutive victories, enter the battle with a 7-2 record, including 4-0 in the league. Hilton Head is 9-0, 4-0.

It will be the Hawks' biggest test of the year. The Hawks have allowed only 16 points per game, but will be challenged by an offense that is putting up 54.8 points per game.

"They have a quarterback who can run and make plays out of the pocket," Hanahan coach Charlie Patterson said. "They also have great receivers. We have to contain the quarterback. I'm sure that every team that has played Hilton Head has tried to contain their quarterback, but nobody has been able to do

Hilton Head pounded Stall 63-12 to remain undefeated and equal the second-best start in school history. The Seahawks started 9-0

in 1988. Hilton Head's best start was 12-0 in

The Seahawks jumped to a 42-0 lead against Stall and were able to substitute freely most of the game.

Quarterback Aidan Hegarty completed four passes for 63 yards and a score in limited action, while running back P.J. Franklin had 90 yards on the ground and scored a TD.

The Hawks used a balanced attack to defeat the Stags. Ouarterback Victor Colbert was on target, passing for 182 vards and three touchdowns. The Hawks grabbed momentum, scoring on three of their first four possessions to take a 21-0 lead.

"When you score early, you can relax a little," Patterson said. "You can't get too relaxed, but you play better when you are not tight. It also makes play-calling a little easier."

Colbert hit receiver Sam Denmark for a 35yard touchdown for the first score and Cyrone White made it 14-0 with a 10-yard TD run to cap an 80-yard drive.

Colbert hit Jamie Watson over the middle for 10-yard TD pass and the Hawks never looked back.

If there was any doubt in the outcome, it was erased when Colbert and Tre Smalls hooked up for a 20-yard TD pass and Vontre Howard's 34-yard TD run.

"Overall, we played well," Patterson said of his team's performance against the Stags. "We gave up some yardage, but kept them out of the endzone for most part. On offense, we were able to mix the pass and the run. We have to be balanced against Hilton Head."







Hanahan defensive linemen Dominique Green has been selected to play in the 2015 Touchstone Energy Cooperatives North-South game. It is scheduled for Dec. 12 at Doug Shaw Stadium in Myrtle Beach.

Last spring, he claimed the gold medal in the shot with a put of 52-feet, 3 inches.

He says he would love to add to haul of state championship rings with a football and another track and field ring his senior year.

He has football offers from Gardner-Webb, Lenoir-Rhyne, Newberry and North Greenville, while App State and Charleston Southern have shown interest lately.

Jeresaty, Bishop England's North-South selection, has been a starter for most of his four years at the school.

He is no stranger to state championships. He started as a freshman during Bishop England's state championship run in 2012.

"He's a leader," coach John Cantey said in a preseason interview. "His leadership is so valuable."




