DINA holds first meeting with newly-elected board

Resident survey says traffic, development affecting quality of life on Daniel Island

There was a positive force of energy in the room at the Daniel Island Neighborhood Association's first meeting with its newly-elected board on May 4. Star Wars Day had nothing to do with it.


Residents dropped in to Daniel Pointe Retirement Community last Wednesday evening to meet and greet with the 2022-24 board members, along with staff from the Daniel Island Property Owners Association, the City of Charleston and Charleston P.D. Team 5 representatives. More than just mingling was going on – it was just as much educational as conversational.

In the background of the Daniel Pointe theater was a PowerPoint slideshow on an automatic timer cycling through a resident survey. It was only a few slides, but the feedback was informative.

DINA's 2022 Resident Survey, which received approximately 250 responses, was composed of several questions relating to

quality of life and public safety concerns and recommendations. The results included:

Which two issues do you consider the most significant affecting the quality of life on Daniel Island? The overwhelming majority of the poll, 160 and 150 votes, said traffic and development.

Do you consider the police presence is adequate on Daniel Island? The consensus was yes by a 60-40% vote.

If you consider the police presence is inadequate on DI, what can be improved? More than 60% said traffic violation enforcement.

A word cloud, a visual representation of data depicted by keywords, was attached to the resident survey and it was quite telling. The three most popular words that residents opined on DINA's resident survey spelt out: Need more street parking.

DINA is a volunteer organization formed



by residents and sanctioned by the City of Charleston since 1998. The mission is to preserve and enhance the quality of life on Daniel

Household memberships, which include two people living together, cost \$40 annually. Individual memberships cost \$25. DINA will meet again Aug. 31. The next meeting to follow is Nov. 9. For more information, visit the new DINA website at DINeighborhood.

SWAN LAKE




Chris Hamil, field operations manager for the POA, explained that the two lifelike swans placed in Smythe Lake are part of a concerted effort to responsibly and ethically discourage geese from frequenting the pond. Naturally aggressive toward geese, Hamil explained that the swans are part of the POA's overall goose control plan. He said that over the past year there was an increase in goose activity at Smythe Lake with upwards to 50 geese soiling the area and at times becoming aggressive towards people. In addition to the tethered lifelike swans, the POA has used flashing lights at night as well as loud noises to discourage the geese from taking up residence.


DI Waterfront Park Trail rerouted



Beginning May 4, a portion of the Daniel Island Trail at Waterfront Park was rerouted to allow for the construction of The Waterfront Phase 2. The POA anticipates that the trail will remain rerouted for at least a year to 18 months. The above map indicates the new route. The temporary trail is marked with signage and provides for the trail to remain open and connected to the Barfield Park Bridge. The trail to the beach currently remains open.





Protect and preserve

MaeRe Skinner recipient of national DAR 'Historic Preservation Recognition Award'

If there is ever an effort to protect or preserve places of historic significance in the Cainhoy community, you can bet longtime resident MaeRe Skinner will be front and center.

Skinner, whose family ties to the area date back generations, has been advocating for her community for as long as she can remember. She worked tirelessly to safeguard local historic lands, preserve relics of the past, and honor the lives of those laid to rest in this once rural enclave on the shores of the Wando River. And her efforts have not gone unnoticed.

On April 16, Skinner received the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) "Historic Preservation Recognition Award." According to the DAR website, the award "recognizes and honors an individual or group that has done recent remarkable volunteer work at the community level." Skinner, a member of the Charleston-based DAR Rebecca Motte Chapter, was nominated for the honor by her chapter regent, Katie Hyman, who described Skinner as "an excellent candidate."

"MaeRe Skinner has worked on historical preservation projects more than half her life," wrote Hyman in her nomination letter. "She is a Cainhoy, South Carolina, native whose father, a local shrimper, taught her the importance of preserving her natural surroundings and the remnants of those who came before us."

At the core of Skinner's nomination was her work on behalf of the "Old Ruins Cemetery" (also called McDowell Cemetery), where many of her family's ancestors are buried. Located off Clements Ferry Road,

Cainhoy resident receives historic preservation award

the site dates back to pre-Revolutionary War times and includes an adjacent African American burial ground. Within the cemetery's borders are the foundational remains of the late 17th century "Cainhoy Meeting House," used as a field hospital for Patriots during the Siege of Charleston. Skinner's late father, Thomas Burgess Chandler, was a charter member of the nonprofit Cainhoy Methodist Church and Cemetery Old Ruins Corp., which was founded in 1988 to oversee the site. Skinner has been at the helm of the organization since 2006.

"My grandfather and father always maintained it, passed down its history, and now my husband and I do along with our son, daughter and grandson," Skinner told The Daniel Island News in 2018.

Skinner and others in the community have fought to protect the cemetery from encroachment by the nearby Oak Bluff development, which is currently expanding close to the site. Last year, Skinners' efforts, along with several other individuals, prompted a halt in construction when what appeared to be possible unmarked graves were discovered during clearing activities taking place near the cemetery's borders.

A study later determined burials were not present, so construction activities soon resumed. But Skinner continues to advocate for the cemetery today to ensure community access to the property remains unobstructed. She and others are also continuing to push for the developer to replace and expand fencing around the cemetery to include the African American burial ground.

Receiving recognition from DAR for her work was especially meaningful, said

"I was absolutely thrilled and so surprised to be honored with this wonderful award from the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution recently, by my lovely Chapter Regent, Katie Hyman," said Skinner. "My work in chairing the corporation that cares for the wonderful old Cainhoy Cemetery and Old Meeting House Ruins there has been an ongoing project for so many years. I will continue to fight for protection and recognition of our Cainhoy ancestors and others since the Meeting House was established in 1699 by the Dissenters."

According to Hyman, Skinner's important preservation efforts extend beyond

Cainhoy.

"She wears many different hats and volunteers to help in any way she can," stated Hyman. "She is currently serving as the chapter's curator. The curator oversees the

City of Charleston Technical Review Committee (TRC) — At the most recent meeting on May 5, the following items were addressed:

A site plan (second review) for the Foundation Place at Point Hope, a commercial development located at 1645 Clements Ferry Road (also identified at 800 Hopewell Drive) and including 5 buildings totaling 38,000 GFA on 4.1 acres, was asked to revise and resubmit. A preliminary subdivision plat (first review)

for Cainhoy Del Webb Phase 2, a 233 singlefamily residential development at Clements Ferry Road and Cainhoy Road, was asked to revise and resubmit.

At the May 12 meeting, the following items of impact to Daniel Island or Cainhoy to be discussed are:

A 1.6 acres site plan for the Cainhoy Del Webb Sales Center at Clements Ferry Road and Cainhoy Road will be reviewed.

At the May 19 meeting, the following items of impact to Daniel Island or Cainhoy to be discussed are:

A site plan (first review) for Woodfield Daniel Island III, a new 175-unit multifamily development on 6 acres located at 225 Benefitfocus Way. Plans indicate it will be located at the corner of Daniel Island Drive and Fairchild Street.

City of Charleston Board of Zoning Appeals – Site Design (BZA-SD) — The most



THREE-PEAT: PSHS boys' tennis best in the state, again



The Philip Simmons High School boys' tennis team claimed its third consecutive state championship May 7 with a 6-0 victory over Christ Church.

With a hoard of titles in the school's brief five-year history, the natural question to ask head coach Richard Schulz was, "Are you building a dynasty?"

The venerable coach's reply was, "I've got a better word for it: We're building a program at this school. Five years ago, I had one player for the first four weeks of the season. In February, we had 31 players come out for the team. We are drawing players from all over."

While it's way too early to talk about the 2023 season, when the Iron Horses will compete at the Class AAA level; the team will be prohibitive favorites to win a fourth straight state crown. All five of the top singles players are scheduled to be back: Josh Lively (sophomore), Henry Hayden (junior), Zade Hyatt (junior), Jordan Mercado (eighth grade) and Matthew Esse (freshman). The doubles team that won at the state tournament is composed of senior classmates Soren Spina and Parker

All seven players posted convincing victories against Christ Church at the Dr. Eddie Floyd Tennis Center in Florence. The Cavaliers were seeking a state record 26th state championship, but were no match for the Iron Horses.

The Iron Horses celebrated their first state championship in 2019. COVID-19 halted the 2020 season. But the Iron Horses didn't miss

a beat, bouncing back to win state championships last spring and again in 2022.

Schulz said coaching high school athletes is a combination of skill, art and energy.

"You have to be an artist because you start the season with a blank canvas," Schulz said. "You have to be able to complete the big picture. It also takes skill, not a lot of it, to be a coach. It takes art and, for me, it takes 100 percent energy. If you give as much energy as the players, you're going to have a good practice."

The Iron Horses didn't have a glitzy regular season, finishing with an 11-7 record against competition that included teams that reached the state finals in Class AAAAA and AAAA. The team also played New Jersey state power Bergen Catholic in April when Bergen Catholic ventured to South Carolina to play a handful of schools from the Palmetto State.

Schulz praised his co-captains for their tennis and academic success.

"Soren has a 5.08 GPA (on a weighted scale)," Schulz said. "And Zade is an exceptional student as well. He takes some challenging engineering courses."

Schulz also coaches the Iron Horses girls' team, which captured the state championship in the fall. The boys' and girls' teams are scheduled to receive their state championship rings at 11 a.m., May 13, at the school's football stadium.

But first, there's still unfinished business as the spring sports schedule winds down. Schulz and his top-three players Lively, Hayden and Hyatt headed back to Florence on May 9 for day one of the individual championships.

The Bishop England girls and both of the Philip Simmons track and field teams shone at their respective region championships.

The Bishop girls ran away with the Region 8-AAA title on May 2 with a 218.5-85 victory over Academic Magnet at Cane Bay High School on May 2. Hanahan topped BE 211-128 to win the boys' crown.

The Iron Horse girls and boys both claimed the biggest trophy at the Region 6-AA championships, which were contested at Woodland High School on May 4.

The Bishop girls won 11 of the 17 events contested including wins in the 4x100, 4x400 and 4x800-meter relays.

In the Region 6-AA meet, Iron Horse sprinter NaJhyria Watson led the way by sweeping the 100-, 200- and 400-meter dashes.

De'Andra Brown claimed two gold medals, winning the 100-meter hurdles and long jump while the Iron Horse girls won the 400- and 3,200-meter relays.

Other gold medal winners included: Phoebe Coggan (800), Samantha Watson (1,600), Elizabeth Habakus (3,200), Kelsey Kieffer (high jump), Madison Jent (pole vault) and Brooke Wall (javelin).

The Iron Horse boys were dominant as well. They swept the 400-, 1,600- and

3,200-meter relays.

Bryce Kinloch (400 and high jump) and Pierce Walker (1,600 and 3,200) were double winners.

Other gold medalists included: JaQue Green (100), Corey Steed (200), Kanye Doyle (800), Troy Stevenson (long jump), Trey Hensley (pole vault) and Abram Wright (discus).

BASEBALL

Philip Simmons claimed the Class AA Region championship Monday night with a 13-3 victory over Camden in a game called after five innings due to the 10-run rule. The victory gave the Iron Horses an 18-9 record and a spot in the Class AA Lower State Championship Series.

The Iron Horses were 3-0 in district play. They also beat Silver Bluff 13-6 and Marion 12-8 to reach the district title game.

Bishop England, meanwhile, went 1-2 in the Class AAA District 6 play. The Bishops beat Lake City 1-0 in the opening round and lost to Battery Creek 11-5 to fall into the elimination bracket. Lake City eliminated BE, 11-4.

SOCCER

Both the Bishop England and Philip Simmons girls' soccer teams were scheduled to play Tuesday night for berths in this weekend's state soccer championships.

The Bishops were scheduled to Oceanside Collegiate with the winner advancing to Saturday's Class AAA state championship game, while Philip Simmons was scheduled to play at Christ Church with the winner moving onto Saturday's Class AA championship.

The Bishops recorded victories over Lake City, Gilbert and Camden. Philip Simmons received a first-round bye and beat Brashier and Buford.

The BE boys won their opening round game with a 2-0 decision over Camden, but dropped a 3-2 decision at Waccamaw. The Iron Horse boys received a first-round bye and lost to Greenville, 2-1, in the second round.

Philip Simmons alum a scholar and an athlete

Track and field standout Noah Ward admits the transition from high school to college has been a challenge – athletically and academically.

But Ward, who is a member of the Harvard University team, after a memorable career at Philip Simmons High School, has been up to the challenge. Recently, he saw his hard work and dedication pay dividends.

He and other members of the Crimson team competed in the prestigious Penn Relays, the oldest and largest track and field extravaganza in the United States. The event, hosted by the University of Pennsylvania, first held in 1895, returned after a two-year hiatus due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Ward was one of 15,000 runners to compete in the meet on April 28-30, which was held at Franklin Field in Philadelphia. It features high school, college and club track teams and individuals across North America.

"It was a great experience," said Ward, a freshman at the Ivy league school in Cambridge, Massachusetts. "It's a meet I've wanted to race at since I was in middle school, so it was nice to finally compete there. My race didn't go well, but I still had a good time competing and traveling with my teammates."

Ward was an honor student at Philip Simmons and concluded a prep career that included 11 individual state championships in cross country and track and field.

Now, Ward's wrapping up the first year of his college experience.

"It has been pretty difficult balancing both academics and athletics, but definitely manageable," Ward said. "I would say about 90 percent of the time here I am either training or trying to get school work done. It took me about the whole first semester to adjust to the academics and get into a healthy routine of studying. Harvard also does an amazing job of providing academic support for its students which has been super helpful."

Ward's potential as a student and athlete made him the perfect candidate to attend Harvard. But the school attracts top talent from around the world, and its talent pool is deep.

"Honestly, the biggest adjustment has been realizing how talented everyone else in the NCAA is," Ward said. "Coming out of high school I thought I was going to continue winning races and making the travel squads, but that was not the case. It was the first time in my life that everyone else on my team was just as good as I am, if not better. It's been a pretty humbling experience, but it has ultimately just motivated me even more to try and become a better athlete."

Ward said he had a mediocre cross country season in the fall of 2021 as he adjusted to the new level of training and academic workload. But his spring track and field season went well, as he improved on his personal bests.

Ward's academic focus is concentrating in economics and possibly a secondary in statistics.

"I'm not sure if I will go to graduate school somewhere, but my mom really wants me to so if it makes her happy I might have to," Ward said.

Ward's goals for his remaining time at Harvard are to stay healthy while remaining motivated and passionate for running. He also wants to compete at the national championship and "enjoy the little things along the way."

Spotted sea trout are hungry and abundant



fishing trends

Recently, several people have inquired what our dog Brody is up to. They all laugh politely when I tell them range, the trout are hungry and abunabout 60 pounds. Then they lower their voices and ask one of two questions. What is he investing in? Where are the fish? Life is always interesting with a fish-finding and stock-trading dog.

What is Brody investing in? Prior to the Federal Reserve raising interest rates, Brody moved into a cash-heavy position. He figured the subsequent volatility would provide a great buying opportunity. A few days later, Brody and I were fishing for trout and an alert came through on Brody's iPhone. All fishing stopped and Brody placed orders for Lithium (LTHM). The next day, LTHM went up. Way up. Now, Brody refuses to eat "dog" food. Only

USDA prime beef will do. Thankfully, he saves a "people" bag for me. Both of us are gaining weight.

As for fishing, Brody says if you fall out of the boat, you will probably land on a spotted sea trout. With the water temperature in the upper 70-degree dant. Look for shallow oyster-laden areas that are adjacent to deeper water. Schools of trout congregate in the deeper water and move up to the shallows to feed. Particularly during lowlight periods. First thing in the morning or late in the evening are best.

The other day, Brody and I were fishing this pattern. The tide was rising and just beginning to inundate the oysters. Finger mullet and mud minnows were using the oyster bars for protection from predators, although not too effectively. Trout were picking off all the baitfish that swam a little too far from the oyster bars.

Brody assessed the situation and

Unfortunately, the trout was tiny. Brody looked at the fish, then gave me the "looks like a trout but only smaller"


I laughed at my own expense. Perhaps he really is a comedian?







May 10, 2012



The Daniel Island Historical Society celebrated the 100th birthday of Master Blacksmith Philip Simmons. The event, which recognized Simmons as "A Poet of Ironwork," was a proud nod to a remarkable figure in the history of the island, and also served as a fundraiser for the DIHS. It connected the memories of

a tremendous Lowcountry artist with the dream of sharing the history of an island he once called home.

Seven endangered sea turtles made their way back to the ocean. Released by the Sea Turtle Hospital of the South Carolina Aquarium downtown, the turtles spent months receiving rehabilitative care for a variety of ailments. Six of the seven, including the Kemp's ridley sea turtles and one rare, loggerhead-green hybrid sea turtle, were rescued from the waters of Cape Cod and flown to Charleston.
