## DI apartment complex hit by rash of car break-ins; 2 guns stolen

The holiday weekend in observance of Martin Luther King Jr. Day ended badly for more than two dozen residents victimized by a rash of car break-ins and a car theft during the early morning hours of Jan. 17 on Daniel Island.

At approximately 3 a.m., the Wharf 7 Apartments garage at 515 Robert Daniel Drive became a crime scene after 23 vehicles were broken into and windows were shattered.

Surveillance footage showed a cop car patrolling the area at 3:03 a.m. Ten minutes later three individuals with window punch devices struck, according to Charleston P.D. Team 5 Commander Matt Wojslawowicz.

"These people were shopping for guns," Wojslawowicz said. "They left cash, credit cards and other

valuables and were strictly looking for guns."

Charleston P.D.'s incident report noted that two firearms were stolen from two vehicles – a Springfield XDS valued at \$700 and a Glock 48 valued at \$400. The remaining vehicles did not have items removed and no car alarm signals were activated, according to Wojs-

"Today I woke up again to shattered glass in my personal car, I just think this is getting out of control... I'm feeling super unsafe," a Wharf 7 Apartments resident posted on a Facebook forum.

Just down the road on Cattle Ranch Street near the Beresford Creek golf course at the Daniel Island Club, two more cars were broken into and one car was stolen. The car was recovered later that morning on Ladson Road in Dorchester County, according to

Wojslawowicz.

Security cameras on the entrance ramps to Daniel Island show that the individuals likely came from the North Charleston area, according to Wojslawowicz. He noted that the interstate exchange makes the island an easy target for smash-andgrab type incidents.

Currently, there are no cameras leaving the island. Cameras on the

exit ramps have been approved by the city, financed by the Daniel Island Community Fund and are expected to be installed sometime this spring.

Team 5 is working with vehicle owners and homeowners to piece together video footage, as the apartment complex does not offer surveillance in the garage area. Wharf 7 Apartments property management this report.

did not respond to a request for comment.

"We could probably have as close to a zero crime rate as possible here on Daniel Island if people would simply lock their cars," Wojslawowicz said. "The majority of our motor vehicle thefts had keys left in the console, keys left in the glove box and doors left

Thirty-eight vehicles were broken into in 2022, according to Wojslawowicz. Team 5 canvasses approximately 42 square miles between Daniel Island and the Greater Cainhoy Peninsula, which comprises just under 30 percent of the City of Charleston.

Police processed all of the vehicles and obtained fingerprints. The case is under investigation.

## Daniel Island School named Palmetto's Finest Awards top-10 finalist

When the Women's Tennis Association relocated the Family Circle Cup, now the Credit One Charleston Open, to Daniel Island in 2001, my casual interest in women's tennis piqued. When I started the paper in 2003, my attention to tennis and its connection to Daniel Island became more intense.

Each year, I follow the top women tennis players in anticipation of their 10-day stint at Daniel Island in the spring. The tennis season starts in Australia and the highlight of January is the grand slam event the Australian Open (AO).

Held in Melbourne, the sports capital of Australia, the AO features the very best men and women tennis players in the world.

In anticipation of our visit to Australia, my Australian daughterin-law purchased tickets to Margaret Court Arena for day one of the AO.

After a delightful road trip along the coast from their home near Sydney to Melbourne, we joined the throngs of tennis fans for the first day of the tournament.

Perfect weather matched our good fortune of seeing two women's tennis matches with strong Daniel Island connections.

The first match of the day featured American and World No. 3 Jessica Pegula, who trained at the former Family Circle Tennis Center under Coach Michael Joyce in the mid-2010s. She won the match, defeating Romanian Jaqueline Cristian, 6-0, 6-1. Another connection from back home involved the Buffalo Bills. Earlier in the day, the Bills defeated the Miami Dolphins in the NFL playoffs wild card round. A Bills' fan proudly displayed his team's flag during the match, as Pegula's parents own the Bills' franchise.

We also were treated to a match involving two former AO cham-

## DI mentors mold young minds, shape future lives

You don't need to be perfect to be a mentor, according to Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Lowcountry President and CEO Merridith Crowe.

"Being a mentor is not like being a parent; it's better," Crowe said. "We're looking for individuals who are interested in helping young people discover their strengths and talents, develop a stronger sense of self, and strong aspirations for their future."

January is National Mentoring Month, a time to join together as a community to help young people realize their hopes and

Big Brothers Big Sisters provides oneon-one mentoring relationships that support the social and emotional development of children between the ages of 7 and 18 in the Charleston tri-county area. Mentors, called Bigs, spend two hours, twice a month with their mentees, or Littles, engaged in activities of their choice.

"It's not fancy, it's ordinary time where

that child is the center of the world: that is the power behind the program," Crowe said. "Our Littles do better in school, they develop

healthier relationships with their peers and their parents, and they end up being more likely to avoid risky behaviors that can derail their futures."

When Sydney Carella was a child, her older sister had a Big, and that sparked her desire to become a mentor. "The Big Sister was just so cool; she would pick up my sister and go on all sorts of adventures," Carella said. "As I got older I thought, 'I'm going to do that someday."

Carella, a logistics brokerage supervisor who also teaches music and coaches girls volleyball, was matched with her Little Sister last year. Janessa is 12 years old and loves animals, music and grilled cheese sandwiches. The pair enjoy walking around

local parks, selecting books at the library, and going out for ice cream.

"The opportunity to see things through a child's eyes again... it's a reminder of how

beautiful growing up is," Carella said.

Last year, Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Lowcountry supported 200 mentor matches, with a goal of 300 this year. But 400 kids are still waiting for a mentor and the organization was awarded a grant from the Daniel Island Community Foundation to support matches on Daniel Island and the Cainhoy peninsula.

"It's an easy way to give back to your community and it's really fun to have an impact and an influence on the younger generation," Carella said.

Steve Smith knows the power of mentoring, something he has done most of his life. "My first job was teaching swim lessons and I saw how much you can help people if you just give them a little bit of your time and effort," said Smith, an attorney who has spent decades serving on local YMCA and school boards, along with coaching and officiating youth sports.

When Smith began his law career, his mother told him he better be nice; advice he took to heart and now shares with new lawyers he mentors through the South

Carolina Bar. "We don't have to be aggressive against each other to be successful," he said. "You can get your point across by showing professionalism and civility."

Last year Smith became a mentor and coach for First Tee of Greater Charleston, a youth development program that introduces children to the game of golf while instilling core values and teaching life skills like conflict resolution, goal setting, honesty and perseverance. The chapter provides educational opportunities to more than 17,000 children each year in Charleston, Berkeley, and Dorchester counties.

As part of the nonprofit's summer camp enrichment program, Smith orchestrated a mock trial in Charleston's old courthouse with a judge and jury. "It was Jack and the Beanstalk, and they had to figure out whether Jack murdered the giant or whether it was self-defense," Smith explained. "The kids were really receptive and really got into it, they did a great job."

Smith said mentoring has taught him to be a calmer person and to put life's problems into perspective, but what he enjoys most is helping children and young adults learn new things and overcome their struggles.

"If you show them you care about what's going on in their lives and you want to help them, kids help themselves," Smith said. "They need direction, they need a good role model, and they need someone to show they care about their happiness and their success."

## Clements Ferry road rage escalates to aggravated assault, shot fired

The following incidents were taken from the City of Charleston Police Department reports within Team 5, which serves Daniel Island and parts of the Cainhoy peninsula, between Jan. 1-15.

#### **BICYCLE THEFT**

On Jan. 2, an officer responded to an address on Robert Daniel Drive in reference to a theft of a 2019 black Specialized Roll Step-thru, valued at \$532. It had been locked to a bicycle rack in an open garage located under the apartment complex. The lock had been cut and the bicycle was removed from the location.

Another resident of Robert Daniel Drive reported a bicycle theft on Jan. 7. The complainant stated that an unknown individual stole her slate blue Townie Electra all-purpose bicycle, valued at \$800, from the complex's parking garage during the overnight hours.

#### THEFT FROM A BUILDING

A resident of Fish Tale Road reported

that her Rolex watch that had been stored inside of a bedroom closet had been stolen from her home sometime in December. The watch was valued at \$12,000; a serial number was provided to Team 5 on Jan. 3.

## DI Rotary Club has joyful, mournful holiday season

The Rotary Club of Daniel Island experienced a joyful, yet mournful December to end 2022. The holiday season lit up the month, but the passing of a beloved Rotarian sombered the spirits of many members.

To begin the last month of last year, the club hosted its annual Christmas party on Dec. 7. There was an assembly meeting prior but featured no guest speaker.

On Dec. 14, the club hosted guest speaker Jared Bramblett, an environmental and documentary photographer and engineer based in Charleston. Bramblett, a civil engineering graduate from the University of South Carolina, works primarily on stormwater management, flood mitigation, resiliency, and sustainability projects. He has always been fascinated by the push and pull between people and nature and how we build upon one another. His photographs are often a study of the seams where natural and constructed environments conjoin.



Bramblett said the drainage systems need to be more prominent in Charleston. especially on the peninsula. Charleston's annual precipitation is increasing. Charleston had a 9.92-foot storm surge in 2017 with Hurricane Irma and an 8.72-foot storm surge with Hurricane Matthew in 2016. Hurricane Hugo was the highest storm surge on record at 12.52 feet. Bramblett said Charleston is seeing a significant increase in tidal flooding. Anything above 8 feet is considered a big flood. Since 2018

we've had 313 tidal surges.

In December, a very distinguished club member, Mike Sudzina, passed away at 83. Sudzina was a former past president and significantly impacted the club over the past two decades.

Sudzina modeled the Rotary motto, "Service Above Self." He chaired the annual rubber duck race fundraiser for many years and served a term as club president. For this, his many hands-on project contri-

butions, and his willingness to say yes to any request, he was recognized as Rotarian of the Year.



T ong before there was a sprawling Letennis and concert stadium on Daniel Island, before stately homes dotted the perimeter of Smythe Lake, before Bishop England High School welcomed its first students to the island and before Independence Day golf cart parades and other special events would become celebrated community traditions – a transformative idea took root.

This was to be a different place, set apart from other master planned communities. A place that not only provided its residents with a wonderful quality of life, but that also gave back to the community and the greater Cainhoy peninsula.

Such was the plan inspired by Dr. George Brumley, the late brother of Frank Brumley, who, along with Matt Sloan, has guided Daniel Island's development for decades. Dr. Brumley believed that philanthropy should be part of the fabric of the community, much like schools, churches, libraries and parks. His altruistic vision for the island was officially put in motion with the creation of the Daniel Island Community Fund

(DICF) in 2000.

"I think that the developers of Daniel Island envisioned a mixed-use beautiful community, with a variety of housing types to ensure opportunities for a diverse community," noted Jane Baker, president of the Daniel Island Town Association. "And to underscore that commitment, the importance of recognizing that there are so many neighbors in need within a stone's throw of Daniel Island that have lived in this community for generations should not go without attention."

Managed by a resident-developer advisory board, the DICF is funded entirely through a community enhancement fee on all resale real estate transactions on Daniel Island, and not through annual property assessments. According to Baker, "zero dollars" from those fees are spent on reserves.

"So your assessments go toward general maintenance, all operating costs for all three associations, and reserves for capital assets," she added.

Since its inception, more than \$10 million has been distributed by the DICF in support of various community improvements and



local nonprofit organizations that serve the 29492 or 29450 zip codes.

"It's not only donating money to nonprofits around our area, but it impacts the island and residents as well," said Danielle Stix, associate community manager for the Daniel Island Property Owners' Association. "There are multi-generational impacts - and it's embedded into the culture of why people move here."

#### **MEETING NEEDS**

Last year alone, the DICF dispersed approximately \$1.9 million to fund grants to

various non-profit organizations, as well as community initiatives, events and projects.

On the list of new DICF recipients in 2022 was Feeding of the Multitudes (FOTM), a ministry that provides free food to close to 3,000 people in need each month on the Cainhoy peninsula. The organization received a \$25,000 matching grant from the DICF, which was used to help purchase a new refrigerated food truck for their growing operation.

"That truck is paramount and essential to us in being able to pick up food and distribute food," said Rev. Levi Wright, who runs the FOTM ministry with his wife, Janet. "...The (Daniel Island Community) Fund has really been a blessing to us, in a way that we can't even imagine how to show our gratitude."

Also on the list of new recipients in 2022 was Blissful Dreams Rescue Ranch (BDRR) in Huger. Through its Christiancentered mission, the ranch serves children and adults struggling with psychological, emotional, physical, and relational challenges by offering therapeutic horseback riding and animal-related activities. The money from DICF allowed them to purchase needed equipment, such as safety stirrups, helmets, and support saddles.

"The money has helped us make sure we have equipment available to be able to accommodate and share the love of the Gospel to those of all shapes and sizes, and various abilities," said Jamie Kohler, BDRR founder/director.

East Cooper Community Outreach (ECCO) began receiving support from the DICF in 2007, according to Executive Director Stephanie Kelley. The funding has been incredibly significant, she said. About 23% of ECCO's clients reside in the 29492/29450 zip code areas that are served by the DICF. This year's grant will help them assist close to 300 families with what Kelley calls "comprehensive wrap around services," such as food or clothing, financial assistance, medical or dental care, or prescription assistance. "The Daniel Island Community

Fund is making sure we're here to support the people who live in this area," Kelley said. "We're so grateful."

#### **COMMUNITY ENHANCEMENTS**

The DICF is also an integral part of what residents and visitors see and experience on Daniel Island. The fund has provided for a plethora of community enhancements, including the refurbished waterfront park along the Wando River, the upgrades to Guggenheim Park, the Osprey Trail in front of the Daniel Island School, and playground spruce ups like the one planned for Center Park.

"The level of excellence in our public spaces would not be there, but for the community fund," Baker added.

Additionally, DICF monies make possible a variety of community events, such as Concert in the Park, Independence Day celebrations, the Pumpkin Walk, and Holiday Tree Lighting. The DICF also supports the philanthropic work of island residents and organizations

The Daniel Island Historical Society's tree marker program, the Danziger Cup kids' fishing tournament, and the Daniel Island Exchange Club's Pinwheels program and Fields of Honor event are among the many DICF beneficiaries.

Another philanthropic vehicle, the Daniel Island Community Foundation, is funded through donations of island residents, businesses and employees. Run by a board of island residents, the foundation is tasked with identifying local nonprofit organiza-

tions and special projects that community members are passionate about, such as natural disaster relief, food and clothing drives, or volunteer opportunities. Often, the foundation and DICF work together to support a variety of causes.

"When critical needs arise...our philanthropic organizations can meet the challenge," Baker said. "Those two nonprofits are important to every property owner – to their property values, to the culture, and really the spirit of what we think Daniel Island is, and why it is a different planned community from any other planned community in the country."

#### A LASTING IMPACT

According to Daniel Island resident Steve Slifer, who has served on the DICF Board since about 2004, the DICF has "led the way in providing funds to literally hundreds of charitable organizations over the years."

"I feel good that the developer of this island had a very philanthropic heart and chose to create an organization like the

DICF," he said. "That sets us apart from every other planned community...In my opinion, the residents of this island are some of the warmest, giving people I have come across. Whenever there is a need, they invariably step up to the plate to help."

Longtime DICF board member Bill Stevens called the fund's impact "major."

"The capital improvements on Daniel Island are big, visible, and used by residents," Stevens added. "The annual events are great and well attended. Best of all, perhaps, are the many lives impacted by the charitable work of DI residents and selected charities I'm reminded of the great quote by John Wooden: 'the definition of a good day is when you help someone who cannot repay

have been touched in some way by the work of the DICF over the last 23 years. And even though declining real estate sales last year meant less revenue for the DICF, Baker once again pointed to Daniel Island's resilience.

"We are hoping for the best and that it rebounds and we can fulfill more grant requests in the latter part of the year," Baker

Despite the market's ups and downs, Daniel Island's appeal as a community remains strong, continued Baker, thanks in large part to the vision planted long ago.

"I don't think as many people would be attracted to moving here, frankly, if we did not have such a strong philanthropic mission," Baker added. "... And you can feel that and see that once you're here."

## Rogers unable to rebound in second round of Australian Open

She grew up right before our

One day she's the most celebrated ball girl in the history of the Credit One Charleston Open, which arrived in Charleston as the Family Circle Cup and morphed into the Volvo Car Open. And with the blink of an eye, Shelby Rogers became the face of women's tennis in the Lowcountry; a place where she grew up and began the journey as a professional tennis player who ended up being ranked in the top-30 in the world in the Women's Tennis Association rankings.

Of course, Rogers has changed over the 22 years since being a ball girl on Daniel Island in 2001, the first year the tournament was played in Charleston. Rogers was chosen to present flowers to the inaugural Charleston winner Jennifer Capriati. But she hasn't changed as much as you think.

"I'm still the same person at heart," said Rogers, who begins the 2023 season as a 30-year-old veteran. "I have the same passion for tennis. I still love the sport. It just takes me a little longer to warm up."

Rogers just competed in her seventh Australian Open, the winter jewel of tennis' grand slam events. Rogers topped Arianne Hatona 6-4, 6-3 in the first round, but exited the tourney in the second round when World No. 5 Aryna Sabalenka from Belarus posted a 6-3, 6-1 victory.

"It's one of my favorites," Rogers said of the Australian Open. "It's just a great atmosphere. I really love playing in Melbourne and Adelaide (a tourney that precedes the AO)."

Rogers savors traveling the world and she will play in Abu Dhabi, Dubai and Doh later this year.

Then it's back to the United States, where she plans to play in Indian Wells, Miami and of course, Charleston.

Indian Wells and Miami are back-to-back, two-week WTA 1000 events. Then it's on to Charleston where the clay-court season com-

"Playing in Charleston always has a special meaning," Rogers said, "I love playing in front of family and friends. It's a great feeling when you know the crowd is behind you... you have to make an adjustment after playing (on the hardcourts) in Indians Wells and Miami."

Last year's appearance in Charleston was a brief one. In the first night of play in the newly renovated Credit One Stadium, Rogers seemed to be on her way to victory, winning the first set against Kaia Kanepi and was up 5-4 in the second set when Rogers fell. She needed to take a medical timeout and was never the same as Kanepi posted a 6-7, 7-5, 6-2 victory.

"Definitely not the outcome I wanted tonight," Rogers said after the loss in April 2022. "I guess I have to say the cliché: 'It's not how many times you fall, it's how many times you get back up.""

In addition to Charleston, Rogers plans to play in the other Grand Slam events including the French Open, which concludes the clay court season, Wimbledon and the U.S. Open, which concludes the summer season.

## Bishops, Iron Horses pivot to winning ways as playoffs loom

There was no more dominant girls' high school basketball program in the 2010s in South Carolina than the Bishop England Battling Bishops.

Under coach Paul Runey's guidance, the Bishops appeared in seven state championships during the decade and came away with six state crowns. The first was in 2012. Then there were three consecutive titles, 2014-17. The final exclamation point with the sixth title in 2019 to conclude the eight-year stretch when the Bishops posted an amazing 197-20 record.

The 2020s brought the COVID-19 pandemic to athletics in the Palmetto State, while the Bishops couldn't escape what every great dynasty has succumbed to: talent is cyclical.

Throw in the fact that Runey, the mastermind behind the dynasty, has already said the 2023-24 season will be his final season. So, the program is in transition.

The Bishops are still winning, but just not

### Two more elite talents commit to COCO

World No. 9 and 2021 Charleston champion Veronika Kudermetova and World No. 11 and two-time NCAA champion Danielle Collins have entered the 2023 Credit One Charleston Open, the largest women's-only tennis tournament in North America. The WTA 500 tournament, which is the annual clay season kickoff event on the WTA Hologic Tour, is set to return April 1-9 at Credit One Stadium on Daniel Island.

Kudermetova and Collins join a list of top-ranked players already competing in April's tournament including World No. 2 Ons Jabeur, World No. 3 Jessica Pegula, World No. 10 Belinda Bencic and World No. 13 Madison Keys, among others.

Kudermetova is currently World No. 9 in singles and World No. 3 in doubles. After winning her maiden title in Charleston in 2021, she went on to have a standout 2022 season where she broke into the world's top 10 for the first time. She made the finals in Melbourne (Summer Set 1), Dubai and Istanbul and reached four semifinals and four quarterfinals, including a run to the quarterfinals at Roland-Garros. Her season showcased results of a quarterfinals or better appearance at 11 of her 20 singles events. In addition, she captured three doubles titles - the WTA Finals, Rome and Dubai competed in three additional doubles finals and reached the Australian Open's doubles semifinals.



### Fifteen, Ten, and Five Years Ago in THE DANIEL ISLAND NEWS

#### FIFTEEN YEARS AGO

Jan. 24, 2008



Detailed plans to add 775 lots on the south end of Daniel Island (which is now home to Edgefield Park) were mapped out. The area was slated to include a mixture of multifamily units, townhouses and single-family homes. A plan for the area was previously approved by the city's Technical Review Board in 2006, but, after changes to the city's subdivision standards, the

plan returned to the Planning Commission with a number of revisions. Changes included 450 fewer residential units and an additional seven acres of open space.

In election news, school board candidates Doug Cooper and Karen Smith answered questions about their platforms and vision for the BCSB position. They also autographed children's books that were donated to the Cainhoy and Daniel Island school libraries after speaking at the Daniel Island Rotary Club.

#### **TEN YEARS AGO**

Jan. 24, 2013



Daniel Island resident Dr. Julio Chalela, who for a fourmonth period in 2011 found himself in one of the most dangerous places in the world for an American – deep inside war-ravaged Iraq. More specifically, an Iraqi prison at Camp Cropper in Baghdad, where U.S. forces were holding a number of detainees, including

Al Qaeda suspects. Chalela, a neurologist based at MUSC in Charleston at the time, was deployed to the region as part of his service for the U.S. Army Reserves.

There was an article with general information about lice and how it spreads. According to the Daniel Island School nurse at the time, Dana Liles, the school had about 20 cases so far that school year. Her biggest tip to parents to help keep the spread of lice to a minimum is for parents to tell other parents about cases if they've had friends over.

#### **FIVE YEARS AGO**

Jan. 25, 2018



With flu season in full force. local health care providers gave tips on how to stay safe during the flu season. Getting vaccinated was the number one tip. Other preventative measures included avoiding close contact with sick people; covering the nose and mouth with a tissue when coughing; regularly

washing hands with soap and water; and cleaning and disinfecting surfaces and objects that could be contaminated.

With 56% of the total area votes, Republican candidate Nancy Mace came out on top against Democratic opponent Cindy Boatwright in a special election, securing her spot as the first female to hold the South Carolina State House District 99 seat.

Out of five nominees, Daniel Island Real Estate agent Rosie Stieby was elected to be the island's first grand marshal.
