# Island attorney Jessica Carroll aims to safeguard digital usage

Protecting youth from corporate giants that prioritize profits over the health and safety of children is personal to Jessica Carroll. The Captain's Island resident earned her law degree from the Charleston School of Law in 2022 and began working on litigation that alleges social media platforms like Facebook, Instagram and TikTok harm the wellbeing of children and teens.

"When you have children, that is your ultimate legacy," said Carroll, who has two young daughters. "They're my number one priority and I always said if I'm going to spend time away, it was going to be to make the world a better place for them."

Growing research shows the more time

adolescents spend on social media, the more likely they are to develop mental health issues like anxiety, depression, and eating disorders. Experts say these platforms expose kids to online predators, cyberbullying, body image issues, and an unhealthy "comparison culture."

"The algorithms these companies have built are highly personalized and exploit insecurities in young people specifically," explained Carroll, an attorney with Motley Rice in Mount Pleasant. The law firm has filed numerous cases in a national multi-district litigation suit that alleges TikTok, Snapchat, Facebook and other social media sites are designed to hook young users at the cost of their physical and mental health.

"Around age 11 and 12 is when you start going outside your immediate family looking for external validation," said Carroll. "Before social media, that was relegated to your peers and your classroom; now

it's comparing yourself to a manufactured reality of what society has deemed to be the ideal boy or girl."

In 2021, former Facebook manager turned whistleblower Frances Haugen revealed

thousands of company documents that showed the extent of which Facebook and Instagram parent company, Meta Platforms,

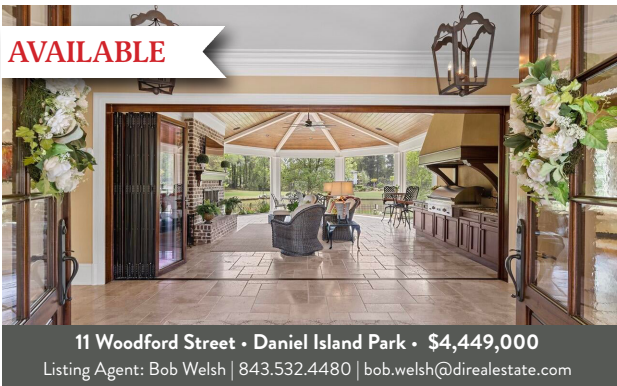

# Daniel Island Historical Society makes history

The Daniel Island Historical Society recently made a little history of its own. For the first time since its founding in 2012, the nonprofit organization received statewide recognition for “exemplary” work.

The Confederation of South Carolina Local Historical Societies (CSCLHS) bestowed on DIHS two Awards of Merit at its annual South Carolina Landmark Conference. The DIHS programs honored were the “Cainhoy Collective: Oral Histories of Life on the Cainhoy peninsula” and the “Historic Cemetery Preservation Project.”

“The Daniel Island Historical Society’s efforts to preserve their historic cemeteries ensure that these sacred burial grounds will not be forgotten,” said CSCLHS Awards Committee Chair J. R. Fennell of the Lexington County Museum. “Furthermore, the DIHS’ Cainhoy Oral History Project is a great example of an organization documenting and preserving the history of a changing community. This oral history project will

help preserve the memories and stories of a diverse group with very differing experiences.”

The DIHS Cainhoy Collective project, a partnership with the College of Charleston Department of History, launched last year. A dozen interviews have been conducted thus far, with more in the works.

The collection will ultimately be housed at the College of Charleston’s Addlestone Library (other locations are also under consideration).

The DIHS Cemetery Committee has worked tirelessly to preserve and care for several local burial grounds, including Lesesne Cemetery, Grove Cemetery, and Simmons Cemetery on Daniel Island, and the Old Ruins Cemetery in Cainhoy.

“It is such a privilege for DIHS to be recognized with two distinct Awards of Merit,” said DIHS President Jessica Knuff. “Special recognition should be given to the dedicated DIHS Cemetery Committee who have donated countless hours to the cleanup and preservation of the island’s most sacred

# U.S. Surgeon General recognizes epidemic of loneliness, offers solutions

When I first took office as Surgeon General in 2014, I didn't view loneliness as a public health concern. But that was before I embarked on a cross-country listening tour, where I heard stories from my fellow Americans that surprised me.

People began to tell me they felt isolated, invisible, and insignificant. Even when they couldn't put their finger on the word "lonely," time and time again, people of all ages and socioeconomic backgrounds, from every corner of the country, would tell me, "I have to shoulder all of life's burdens by myself," or "if I disappear tomorrow, no one will even notice."

It was a lightbulb moment for me: social disconnection was far more common than I had realized. In the scientific literature, I found confirmation of what I was hearing. In recent years, about one-in-two adults in America reported experiencing loneliness.

And that was before the COVID-19 pandemic cut off so many of us from friends, loved ones, and support systems, exacerbating loneliness and isolation.

Loneliness is far more than just a bad feeling—it harms both individual and societal health. It is associated with a greater risk of cardiovascular disease, dementia, stroke, depres-

sion, anxiety, and premature death.

The mortality impact of being socially disconnected is similar to that caused by smoking up to 15 cigarettes a day and even greater than that associated with obesity and physical inactivity. And the harmful consequences of a society that lacks social connection can be felt in our schools, workplaces, and civic organizations, where performance, productivity, and engagement are diminished.

Given the profound consequences of loneliness and isolation, we have an opportunity, and an obligation, to make the same investments in addressing social connection that we have made in addressing tobacco use, obesity, and the addiction crisis.

The Surgeon General's Advisory on loneliness shows us how to build more connected lives and a more connected society.

If we fail to do so, we will pay an ever-increasing price in the form of our individual and collective health and wellbeing. And we will continue to splinter and divide until we can no longer stand as a community or a country. Instead of coming together to take on the great challenges before us, we will further retreat to our corners — angry, sick, and alone.

We are called to build a movement to mend the social fabric of our nation. It will take all of us — individuals and families, schools and workplaces, health care and public health systems, technology companies, governments, faith organizations, and communities — working together to destigmatize loneliness and change

our cultural and policy response to it.

It will require reimagining the structures, policies, and programs that shape a community to best support the development of healthy relationships.

Each of us can start now, in our own lives, by strengthening our connections and relationships. Our individual relationships are an untapped resource — a source of healing hiding in plain sight. They can help us live healthier, more productive, and more fulfilled lives.

Answer that phone call from a friend. Make time to share a meal. Listen without the distraction of your phone. Perform an act of service. Express yourself authentically. The keys to human connection are simple, but extraordinarily powerful.

Each of us can start now, in our own lives, by strengthening our connections and relationships. Loneliness and isolation represent profound threats to our health and well-being. But we have the power to respond. By taking small steps every day to strengthen our relationships, and by supporting community efforts to rebuild social connection, we can rise to meet this moment together. We can build lives and communities that are healthier and happier. And we can ensure our country and the world are better poised than ever to take on the challenges that lay ahead.

Our future depends on what we do today.

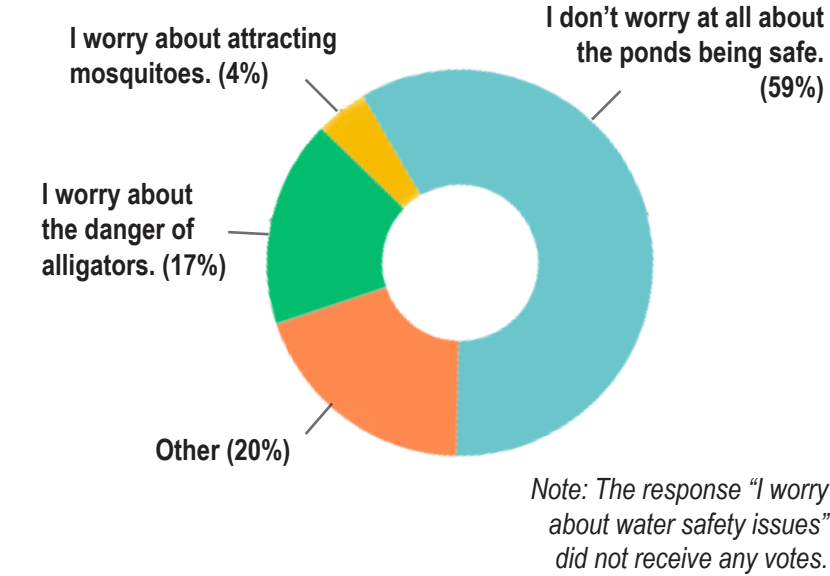

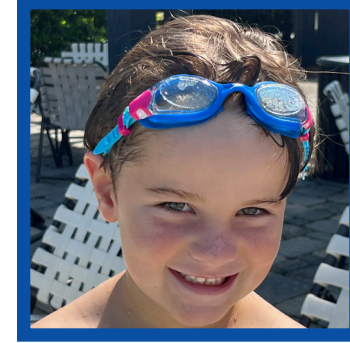

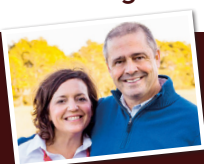

# Real estate prices remain high

Twenty-five homes sold on Daniel Island in April. As of May 9, there were 80 homes listed for sale. Twenty-four were active listings and 56 listings were under contract.

The total sales for the month were \$41,784,300. The most expensive home sold in April was in Daniel Island Park on Captain’s Island for \$4.5 million. The least expensive home sold was a condo at Daniel’s Landing that sold for \$436,000.

According to Renee Reinert Pote, the Daniel Island market continues to have low inventory. However, prices remain high.

“An interesting fact is that the value of the homes sold has increased. Out of 25 properties sold in April, 18 of them are over \$1 million and 10 of those properties are over \$2 million,” Pote noted.

# Carroll urges more social media safeguards

knew about the harm its products caused children.

“What makes it so disturbing is that these companies specifically targeted people under 13 and they designed their products to addict children to these sites,” said Carroll, who thinks social media companies have not done enough to keep kids safe in the largely unregulated industry.

A Lowcountry native, Carroll was born at the old Charleston Naval Hospital and graduated from the College of Charleston in 2007. She worked in technology for several years before pursuing a law degree. “I wanted to do something that I’m passionate about and that benefits children in the long run,” she said of her new career.

“When we (Motley Rice) take on a cause, we attack it not only from the litigation front, but we work on the legislation front,” Carroll said. “We have bipartisan support for legislation that better protects young people online and we’re working with senators to get better laws in place to hold these compa-

nies accountable.”

Child advocates and lawmakers are calling for more parental controls that include time limits and parental consent for minors to open a social media account, along with safeguards to protect kids from inappropriate content and advertising.

“We want them to change their design features that are inherently addictive like intermittent variable rewards that work the same as slot machines at casinos,” said Carroll. “Adults and kids underestimate the time spent on social media platforms and lose all concept of time when they’re scrolling through.”

Carroll advises parents and guardians to read up on the hazards of social media and to have open conversations with their children about appropriate screen time. She follows a Facebook group called Parenting in a Tech World where other parents discuss their personal struggles and share warning signs to watch out for.

“These little dangers for kids are lurking

they’re taking your data and advertising things to your children that is probably inappropriate.” She recommends all technology like cell phones, tablets and computers be taken out of children’s rooms at night and charged in a secure location.

Research shows the more time youth spend immersed in digital devices, the less time they spend on healthy, real-life activities like sports, music, outdoor recreation, and face-to-face interactions with their peers.

Carroll and her husband, Bill, a Hilton Head native and orthopedic surgeon, appreciate the family atmosphere and access to nature on Daniel Island, where they feel safe letting their kids ride bikes around the neighborhood.

“It is just a utopia for raising children,” she said. “These types of neighborhoods that are reminiscent of how Bill and I grew up are hard to find in this day and age.”

# BEAUTY, RECREATION & STORMWATER MANAGEMENT

## DISCOVER DANIEL ISLAND'S PONDS

There is no doubt that the extensive network of ponds on Daniel Island adds to the aesthetic and recreational vibrancy of the community.

The main purpose of the ponds, however, is stormwater management and retention.

“The 50 ponds we manage are primarily infrastructure stormwater facilities – that is their purpose and secondarily we try to beautify when we can to make it an appealing part of the neighborhood,” said Jane Baker, president of the Daniel Island Property Owners’ Association. “Their number one purpose is to make sure we don’t have flooding on the island.”

Operations Manager Chris Hamil is tasked with keeping the DIPOA managed ponds healthy and functioning well.

Hamil compared the pond network to hubs and spokes of a subway system, noting, “Every year I grow more appreciative of the engineering involved. To have all of these interconnected stormwater retention ponds and see how well they reacted during the nine

years I’ve been here – we’ve had the thousand-year flood, multiple big and small hurricanes – it is just phenomenal.”

### STORMWATER MANAGEMENT AND FLOOD PREVENTION

Stormwater management and flood prevention were part of the early development phase of Daniel Island, dating back to as early as 1992. In accordance with the city approval process, stormwater ponds are added with each phase of development detailed in the Daniel Island Master Plan, including for the newest phase at The Retreat.

Hamil explained that in addition to continued ongoing maintenance and inspections of the ponds, he also schedules annual inspections with engineers before each hurricane season to make sure there are no obstructions in or around the piping.

Root systems on the bank are going to find water near the drainage pipes, he said, adding, “We are very diligent about trying to keep those cleared.”

In order to keep the system robust, the POA will begin dredging

some of the older ponds next year and will continue dredging two or three ponds a year going forward.

Hamil said that at a recent symposium he attended about the city’s stormwater issues, the city’s Chief Resilience Officer Dale Morris raved about the pond storm management system on Daniel Island and the Cainhoy peninsula.

“We’ve been a model for planned communities in terms of stormwater management,” Baker proudly noted.

### BEAUTY

The POA explicitly tries to maintain the ponds to enhance the aesthetics of the island while at the same time prioritizing flood prevention.

Hamil took a stormwater management course at Clemson to learn strategies to make the ponds healthier and minimize the amount of silt and chemicals that get into them.

Hamil stocks the ponds with carp and tilapia to prevent algae blooms and aquatic weeds from taking over.

His team keeps a 3 to 4-foot wide collar around the ponds with 12 to 18-inch high landscaping. This prevents silt and runoff from getting into the ponds. Plantings include iris and lilies to keep the edges of the ponds from eroding, but also provide vibrant colors.

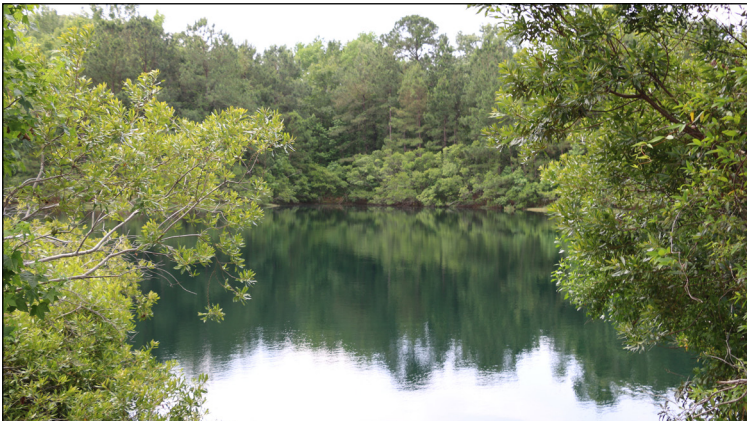
Baker explained, “Keeping the landscaping low and not overgrown is part of the maintenance schedule to ensure Daniel Island doesn’t flood.”

### RECREATION

Hamil urged islanders to use the ponds for fishing, asking that they catch and release the tilapia and

carp. He added, “I am adamant about no cast netting” because, he explained, it depletes the fish life and robs the ponds for others to enjoy.

In addition to stocking the ponds with carp and tilapia for pond health, the POA also stocks Smythe Lake with recreational fish species such as bass, shellcracker, and bluegill.

Smythe Lake has a boat landing and the POA rents paddle boards and kayaks. Hamil said that the use of kayaks and paddleboards on the

ponds is not prohibited but warned, “There is wildlife, including alligators, so you enter at your own risk.”

Baker added, “Because there is less opportunity to encounter wildlife in the river than in a pond it is generally smarter to keep your kayak and standup paddle board activity to the rivers than playing around ponds and alligators.”

The ponds on the Daniel Island golf courses are also stormwater management ponds but they are managed by the golf club and not the POA.

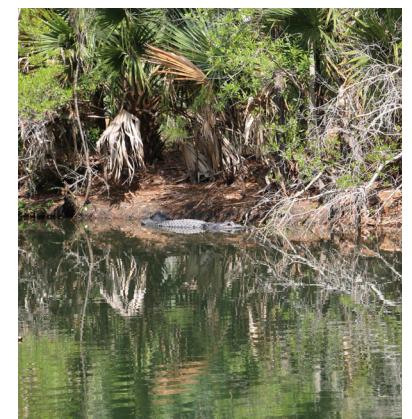

# State Track & Field Championships to feature local athletes

## Iron Horse girls win lower state

The Philip Simmons High School girls' track and field dominated the Class AA state championships the past two years, winning back-to-back titles in a most convincing fashion.

In 2021, the Iron Horses reigned supreme with a 161-60 victory over Woodland. Last spring, it was more of the same as the Iron Horses raced past the field to claim a second straight title with a 129-80 victory over Greer Middle Collegiate.

This spring, Philip Simmons made the transition to Class AAA as enrollment continued to swell at the school. But it's been more of the same on the track.

On May 13, the Iron Horse girls excelled in their final tune-up for the High School League's Class AAA state championships, which will be held at 9 a.m., May 20, at Lower Richland High School.

The Iron Horses were at the head of the class on May 13 at Camden High School,

winning the Lower State Championship with a 134.5-96.5 victory over Beaufort. Waccamaw was third with 82 and Camden was fourth with 66.

"Saturday was a long but amazing day," PSHS girls' coach Emma Santor said. "The heat was out, but we were prepared to execute the assignment of getting as many qualified for the next level. The kids fully understood the assignment and exceeded our expectations."

The Iron Horses had their share of gold medals at Camden. But what separated them from the rest of the field was their depth. The Iron Horses scored 18 points in the 800 run, 22 points in the three relays and 23 points in the pole vault for a combined 63 points in just three events. The 63 points were more points than 16 teams scored for the entire meet.

Madison Jent won the pole vault by clearing 11-0 as the Iron Horses finished 1-2-4 in the event.

Zhaire Mack continued to impress, winning the javelin with a throw of 110-6.

The Iron Horse boys are seeking their second state title in three years.

## BE track and field teams qualify a slew of competitors

The Bishop England High School girls' track and field team will bid for the 14th state championship in the program's illustrious history when the High School League hosts its Class AA state championships May 21 at Spring Valley High School.

The meet commences at 5 p.m. and should provide some outstanding times and distances – and perhaps a little stress and much excitement. The meet, which features 18 running and field events, could come down to the final leg of the final race of the day, the 4x400-meter relay.

"The girls will be in a battle all night long against Woodland, Gray Collegiate, Eau Claire and Greer Middle College," coach Tony Colizzi said. "They will have to perform as well as they did at Lower State. If each girl does what they are capable of, the girls will be in contention all night. All five teams are very strong teams. The championship will probably come down to the last event, the 4x400-meter relay."

The Bishops will have 17 girls compete at state after the impressive performance May 13 at the Class AA Lower State meet, which was contested at Woodland High School. Woodland claimed first place with 123 points while BE was second in the 17-team meet with 119.5. Wade Hampton claimed third with 110 and Academic Magnet was fourth with 55.5.

The Bishops, as usual, picked up a majority of its points in the distance runs.

Freshman Nora Brahim won the 1,600-meter run in 5:23.20 and was second in the 3,200 run to account for 18 points.

Marin Byrne was second in the 800 and Caroline Edgerton collected a bronze medal.

Grace Buss was third in the 3,200 run and second in the 400 hurdles behind teammate Marlee Asmer, who won the hurdles in 1:11.01.

Emma Hamrick won the high jump by clearing 5-0. Freshman Katie Griffin was second in the pole vault.

The 4x800-meter relay team of Byrne, Edgerton, Asmer and Buss won a gold with a clocking of 10:38.40 to win the event by 35 seconds. The 4x400-meter relay team

captured bronze.

### BOYS TRACK & FIELD

Wade Hampton claimed the boys' championship with 141 points to edge Woodland, which tallied 138 points. Academic Magnet finished in third place with 84 points and the Bishops were fourth with 62.

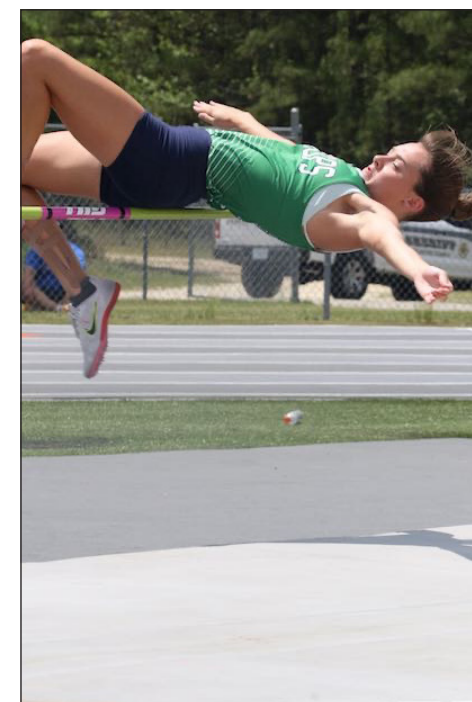
Junior Justin Hafner led the Bishops with a pair of gold medals. He won the 800- and 1,600-meter dashes with respective times of 2:02.90 and 4:32.40.

Jackson Muller won a silver medal in the 800 run, Jack Leahy was third in the 400-meter dash while the Bishops' 4x800 relay team also won a bronze medal.

"I thought both teams competed very well," Colizzi said. "Everyone that we thought would qualify did, and we had a few surprises that also qualified."

"Mentally Lower State is harder than the state meet," Colizzi said. "We always tell the kids that 'They can't win the state meet at Lower State, but they can lose it.'"

They know that if they don't deliver their best at Lower State, they may not get a chance to run at the state meet."

It's a sign of the times.

Philip Simmons High School, which is getting ready to complete only its sixth academic year after opening in 2017, recently held a college signing day ceremony in which nine student-athletes finalized their matriculation plans.

It was the biggest signing ceremony at the school to date, and that number will continue to grow as the school expands and enrollment increases.

The football team, which posted a 7-4 record in the fall and finished second in Region 8-AAA with a 3-1 mark under coach Eric Bendig, led the way with three players signing: Jac'Que Greene, Griffin Gore and Chip Carlson.

Greene and Carlson are headed to North Greenville University while Gore will matriculate to Wofford.

Greene was an all-state receiver who had 42 career receptions for 730 yards and 12 TDs. He competed in track and field and basketball as well. He averaged 12.3 points and 4.8 rebounds as a senior.

Carlson is a rugged middle linebacker who tallied 129 tackles, including 69 solo stops last fall.

Gore was one of the top kickers in the state last fall, hitting 39-42 of PATs and was 7 of 9 in field goal attempts. He also averaged 35.9 yards a punt.

Claire Esse, who was an all-state soccer selection for the second straight year after

helping the Iron Horses to a 15-4 record, will play for UNC Greenville. She tallied 21 goals this spring and 12 assists for 54 points.

Madison Jent, who has helped the Iron Horses win state titles in track and field in 2021 and '22, will stay close to home and will compete for the College of Charleston. She is one of the top pole vaulters in the state and owns the school record at 12-6. She was crowned the Class AA state champ for the vault in May 2022.

Another track standout, Jeremiah Bonano, will attend Wingate University. He owns the school record with a leap of 44-8 in the triple jump. He also competes in the long jump.

Grayson Mitchell will attend William Peace University and play baseball. He was on the varsity team as a seventh-grader and played in 95 games in his career. He hit .359 with 17 RBI his senior year was 0-1 in six appearances as a pitcher. He had a 1.05 ERA and two saves.

Kennedy Rivers, who has been a member of the girls' basketball team since the seventh grade, will head up Interstate 26 to attend Claflin University. She was an all-state selection numerous times and finished as the school's all-time leading scorer. She averaged 15.1 points her senior season to help the Iron Horses to a 20-6 record.

Finally, Kylee Kellermann will be a preferred walk-on in basketball at Clemson. She was the first Iron Horse girl to score 1,000 career points. But Kellermann's junior and senior seasons were cut short due to knee injuries.

## fishing trends

Sometimes, a picture is worth a thousand words. Well, in this case approximately 400 of them. At first glance, the picture is of me with a sailfish catch and release flag. Pretty ordinary stuff. However, there is more to the story.

Last year, my brother David passed away unexpectedly. If you are a regular reader of this article (if there is such a thing), you know my brother. We fished together all the time. So, Dave was in The Daniel Island News nearly every week.

This year, Elliott (my son), Brody (the amazing fish finding and stock trading dog), and I are fishing to remember David. For every billfish that we catch and release, we

are making a donation to the South Carolina Memorial Reef. Thus, our recent obsession with blue marlin and sailfish.

Learning to catch blue marlin and sailfish has been a challenge. Every week we set out to be heroes (by catching and releasing the target species). Only to be humbled and return to the dock as zeroes. It is discouraging but we are learning together and that makes it OK.

On Saturday, Elliott, Brody, and I set out once again to be heroes. We were 30 miles offshore when the sun came up.

Elliott looked at me and said, "Today is the day."

I laughed because he says that every time we fish offshore. Then, after a momentary pause, I replied "I think you are right."

We began fishing 59 miles offshore in an area with a 2-degree temperature break. Shortly after

we began trolling, a blue marlin attacked our squid chain and Spanish mackerel teaser. Elliott quickly deployed a rod rigged with a magnum size Ballyhoo. The marlin refused to eat it. Dejected, we watched the big fish swim away.

A few hours later, a sailfish attacked the teaser. Once again, Elliott deployed the pitch bait. This time the sailfish switched to the bait from the teaser and we hooked up.

Total elation! It was the first time we successfully performed the "bait and switch" technique on a billfish.

In billfish circles, it is customary to fly a release flag each time you catch and release a billfish. After releasing our sailfish, Elliott handed me a flag saying let's fly this one.

It was a custom flag with the phrase "This one's for Dave." I laughed. Behind my sunglasses there were tears in my eyes.

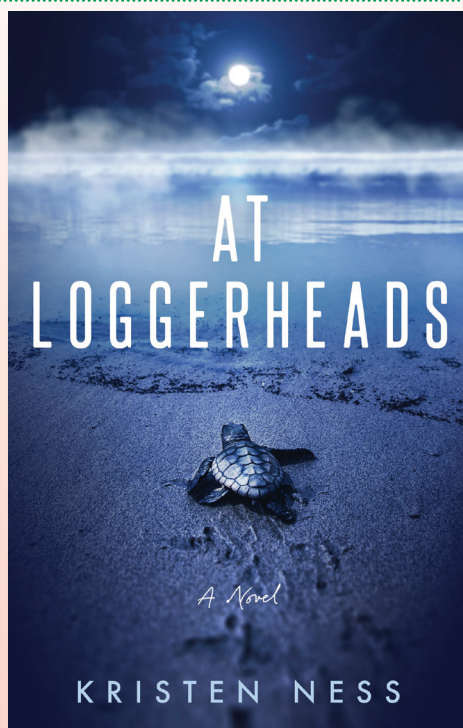

The Cass Elias McCarter Guardian ad Litem Program, a division of the South Carolina Department of Children's Advocacy, is offering free on-line training beginning May 23 to those interested in becoming a volunteer Guardian ad Litem (GAL) in Berkeley County and surrounding areas.

GALs advocate on behalf of abused and neglected children who are involved in family court legal proceedings through the Department of Social Services (DSS).

Volunteers should be at least 21 years old, have a clean criminal record, no previous DSS case history, and be able to contribute four to five hours a month of time for a child.

Currently the Berkeley County GAL Pro-

gram is serving 336 children, but there are only 36 volunteer GALs to assist.

While GAL staff fill in the gaps, the need for more volunteers is urgent. "We're always looking for dedicated individuals who are passionate about advocating for children," said Christy Vinson, recruitment and training director.

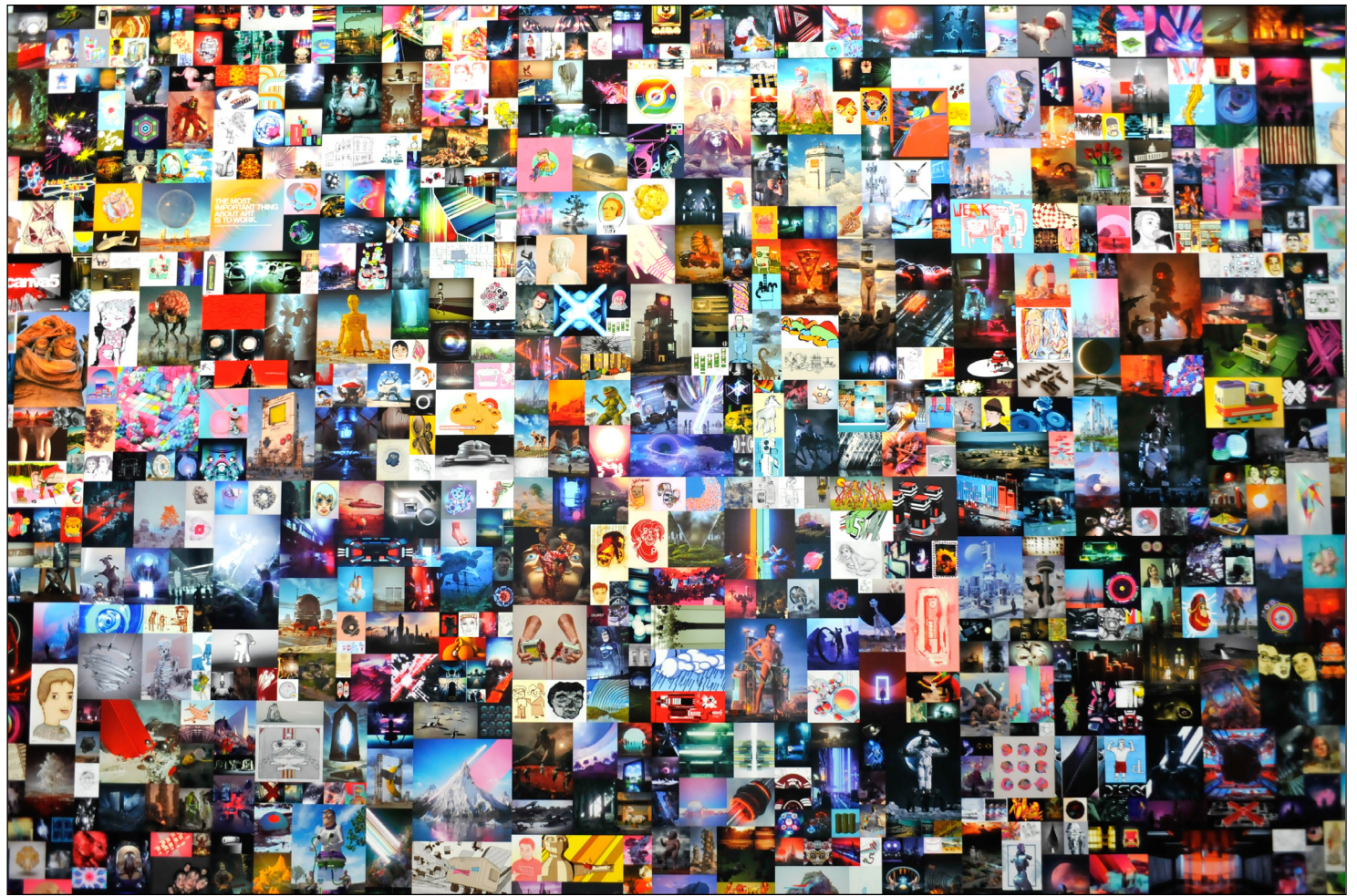
Other favorite subjects embraced in Beeple's art: Pokémon, Buzz Lightyear, the Simpsons and Michael Jackson.

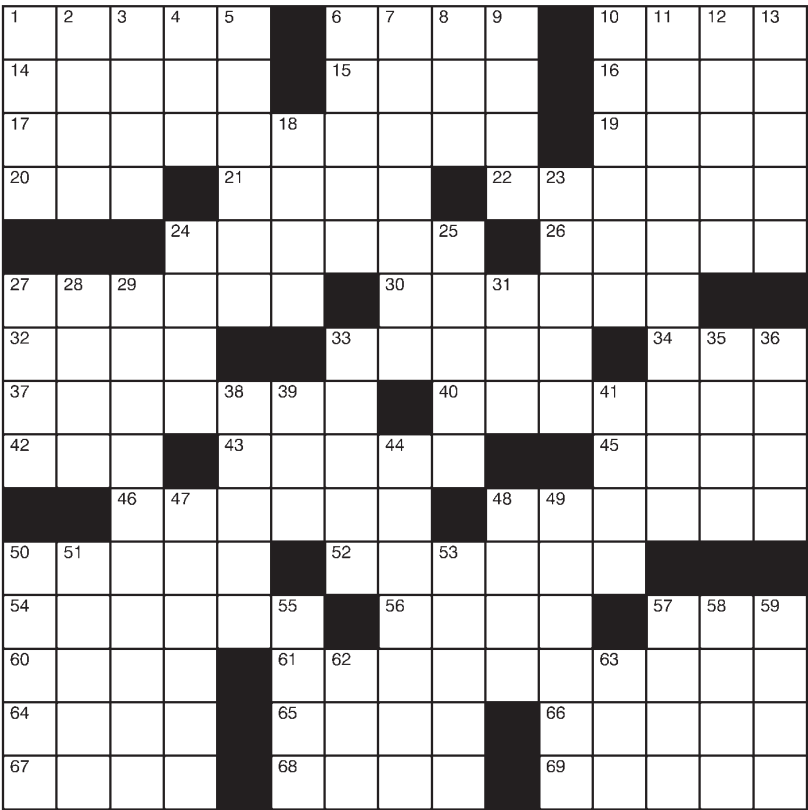

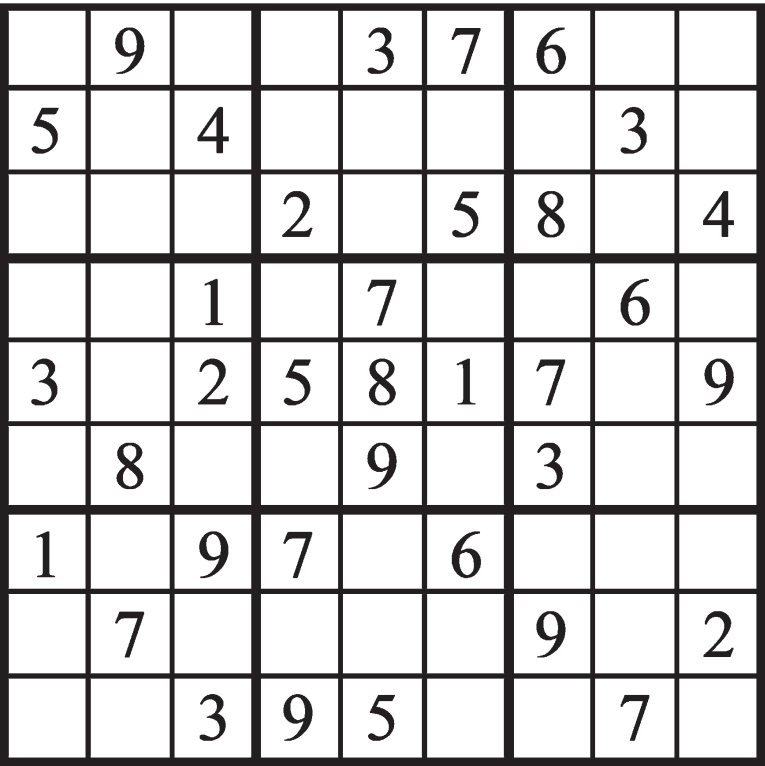

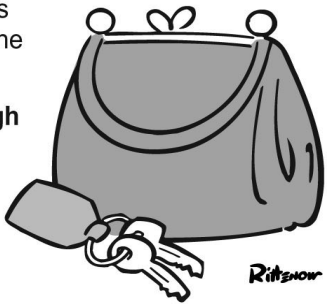

# Fifteen, Ten, and Five Years Ago in THE DANIEL ISLAND NEWS



## FIFTEEN YEARS AGO – HOW IS DANIEL ISLAND PERCEIVED?

A collection of alternative, and often humorous, viewpoints from the website city-data.com, offered varied views on how Daniel Island was perceived. One entry described the island as “a beautiful place to live,” but others commented that the community had a troubling “eerie” quality. Comments

touched topics ranging from enjoying the Family Circle Cup (now called the Credit One Charleston Open), to “liking the island but wouldn’t consider living there.”

In another article, Daniel Island’s development perception drew comparisons to director Peter Weir’s fictional New Urbanist town of Seahaven in his 1998 hit movie “The Truman Show.”

## TEN YEARS AGO – DINA MEETING ON DI MASTER PLAN
